The civil war in America. BELLIGERENTOPERATIONS ON SEA AND

LAND.

The Confederate ship-of-war Susa-forran the blockade off the port of Charleston, and escaped to see. The privateer Jefferson Davis has captu-red five Northern vessels off Cape Hutters, and sent them into unblockaded Southern ports. Six revenue-cutters have been despatched from No v York and Boston in pursuit of the

corramudes.

On land the fighting has been confined to General M'Lellan's division in Western Virginia, and General Lion's in Missouri. The former division at tacked the intrenched camp of the Confederates, numbering 2000 mark Rich Mountais, near Boreloy. The Confederates were routed, and all their guns, camp equipage, and aragges were captured. Sixty Confederates and, twenty Unionists were killed in the encounter.

In Missouri a battle occurred at Carthage on the 5th inst. 1200 Fa-doralists attacked 4000. State troops, and retired with a loss of eight men and forty-five wounded. On the 12th Colonel Smith routed
