mingo.' There is hardly room for both. 'The Estadante Católico' is a religious paper, like its namesake of Valparaíso. Our colleagues seem to confound it with the 'Standard,' as this was heretofore the only anti-infidel paper in B. Ayres.

The mania for resignations has set in. Major Forrest demands of the National Government his dismissal, as Major Bass did last week. Of course, there is little patriotism in abandoning one's colors, but these gallant gentlemen are rather hot-headed, and may repeat, when they get cool, unless they expect better pay from the opposite administration. Dr. Carlos Paz is proposed as Sub-secretary for the Interior, which would be a rise from his late provincial post, but it is not likely he will get it.

The news from the interior is satisfactory. Córdoba is again quiet. The intended murders of Catamarca were happily prevented.

The proposed fusion of parties in Ayres seems likely to be carried out. The articles in yesterday's 'Tribuno' tend to this, and show a decided improvement.

We regret to find there will be no St. Patrick's Dinner this year. Of course the season has been disastrous to Irishmen, but nothing, in our opinion, can excuse the omission of celebrating so great an anniversary.

The brother of the Irishwoman recently lost ought to pay the man who found her at Belgrano, and had the expense and trouble of coming to town. Otherwise we must publish his name, as he has most unfairly sent the man to us, although she is no relative of ours.

Submission of Alvarez.

Attempted Murders in Catamarca

The Pavon brings news from Rosario 1st inst., and Córdoba 2d inst. The Ferro-carill' states as follows:

In Catamarca there has been a wholesale butchery attempted by Governor Maubecin. The intended victims were Senator Gregorio Moreno, and Deputies Francisco de la Vega, and Pedro Cano. The crime imputed to Moreno was his having headed a delegation to Governor Maubecin requesting the return of the printing press to the people. It appears that when it was all arranged that Moreno, Vega, and Cano should be murdered, Maubecin himself went with the hired assassins to San Francisco to kill Moreno.

These hired ruffians, who seemingly had a little more mercy than Governor Maubecin, told him that Moreno was in his path, surrounded by many friends. Excited to return to their work, they again came back, and told the Governor that Moreno was seated with his little daughter on his knee. Thinking that he was speaking falsely, he went to see and satisfy himself, and then he saw that what his comrades said was true. He then retired. The same happened to Vega and Cano. The mercenaries having made a full confession of the whole transaction, Moreno applied to the Federal Judge for protection, but the judge could give him neither protection nor redress.

From Córdoba we learn that Alvarez and his 1500 firebreathers have submitted. He declared that he was not intimidated by Governor Ferreira's 200 infantry, but having taken up arms to free Córdoba, and finding the people content with their *de facto* form of Government, he gave up the contest. The Governor has given him and his adherents a free pardon.

EMIGRATION FROM IRELAND.—It is estimated that above 125,000 immigrants have arrived in the Northern States of America during the past twelve months from Ireland alone, an unusually large proportion of able-bodied men. If we suppose only one fifth of these enter the army, that makes 25,000 men each year to supply the necessary gaps made by war and disease. Should the emigration continue for another year, Ireland will in all probability have furnished in three years 75,000 men, British subjects—a large army in itself—to support the cause of the Federal government.—Morning Post.

The professors, without exception, are good, the English classes are in good hand, and our German friends should congratulate themselves on having the opportunity of confiding the instruction of their sons to such a distinguished scholar as Dr. Bohm.

Intended Flight.—On Monday, by the greatest chance, there was discovered in the prison a hole which the prisoners had been abusing themselves in wide lying, for the purpose of taking French leave of their guardians. Luckily, a want of tools prevented their getting along with their work as fast as they would like. It appears, on examination, that fifteen prisoners were implicated in the plot. This comes somewhat too soon after the escape of the condemned murderers, to be pleasant for honest people, and although not advocates for capital punishment, except in extreme cases, we fancy that rather than place the property and lives of citizens at the mercy of these scoundrels, a little hanging occasionally would do no harm. But we almost feel inclined, when we see the difficulty of getting rogues and murderers punished in the Argentine provinces, to concur with the cousin of Sir Leicester Dedlock, Bart., and "hope he'll be executed"—a link more interest's wanted—get man hang'd presntime, than get man place ten thousand a year. Hasn't the doubt example—far better hang wrong, than never no flet.

Signs of Prosperity.—Yesterday the French ship Marcial Pellestor came into Bs. As with a cargo of coke, rails, and other materials for the Western Railway, and on board the Saint Pierre there came 69 emigrants from (Lavay). We should like to see a vessel or two coming with an assorted cargo of patrones and gold cunzas, for really, judging from the way the brokers are playing Jessie with bullion, it won't be

safe to find a roll of bank notes, as the finder will be sure to lose by picking them up.

Fast Passage.—One of the most rapid passages made by sailing vessels is that of the clipper ship Saint Pierre of the Havre line, which arrived here on the 28th inst., after a rapid run of 35 days from Havre. This even beats the first of clippers, the 'Sovereign of the Seas,' which was for a long time a household word amongst mercantile nautical men, and which will be handed down to posterity as a smart vessel, for its fame is embodied in never-dying verse to the popular tune of 'the Jordan's a hard road to travel—'

The Sovereign of the Seas went to Liverpool, in fourteen days, according to John C. Smith, who reported with surprise, at the dinner of the Yankees of Liverpool.

Argentine Races.—On Thursday next a meeting of the members of the Argentine Jockey Club will be held to choose a new committee.

San Juan.—We regret to learn that the Messrs. Dillon of Dublin, who recently made the tedious journey to San Juan, have been obliged to return to this city, not finding any business in which they could embark in the Far West. They report Major Rickard in good health and spirits, the machinery having arrived. Governor Sarmiento was preparing to leave for his diplomatic post at Washington. We seriously caution young men just arrived and ignorant of the Spanish language from making such excursions into the interior.

La Plata.—To-morrow is the day fixed for the sailing of this steamer to Montevideo and Liverpool. We have received no information about correspondence, but suppose a mail will be made up at the Correo until 3 o'clock this evening.

Another Fossil.—Colonel Payredon has presented to the Museum of the College of Arts the fossil remains of an Antediluvian Mastodontes which were found about half a league from the city of Parana.—(F.C. of Rosario.)
