### THE BUDGET.

We are free to admit that in reviewing the estimates for the fiscal year of 1865, much allowance should be made for the Minister who prepared them; he took the portfolio of Hacienda at the 11th hour, after it had been sent round to all the noted financiers in town: he deserves therefore more sympathy than censure at the present moment.

Influenced by such considerations we cannot blame his Excellency for coming before the public with a budget which on its face shows a deficit of over half a million of patacons. Of course M. Gonzalez is in rather an unpleasant position; which he tries to escape by asserting that the deficit is purely imaginary, although according to arithmetical calculations it is as plain as 2 and 2 make four.

In order that our readers may thoroughly comprehend the question, and know the real financial position of the country, we give the Minister's own figures. The following is a schedule of expenses:—

Such, readers, is M. Gonzalez's budget, which bears the stamp of hurry and superficiality.

In looking through the various items of expenditure, we are struck with the very large figure of 'sundries,' which is no less than \$30,000 sterling. We should certainly like to know who keeps the petty cash of the Republic, and see his accounts published.

It is to be regretted that so much of the public moneys should be spent (we were about to say squandered) in the maintenance of the army, and so little in public education.

But the item which most attracts our notice is the revenue from imports, which is put down at four millions, which we certainly think must be an exaggerated estimate, as it bears no proportion whatever to the revenue collected from exports which is put down at a million and a half.

There are many other items which are open to much comment, but as we said before we do not wish to be severe with a young man who is beset with difficulties. We feel rather inclined to encourage him, and advise him not to be 'disheartened' if people style him DEFICIT GONZALES.

**EDITOR'S TABLE.**  
We have to return thanks to M. Mansilla for a copy of his celebrated 'Atar Gull.' We are happy to hear that this drama has met with the greatest success: it will be produced in Colon, we understand, next week. A friend, who pretends to Persian literature, gives the following translation. "Atar"—Otto: "Gull"—of roses (?).

The native newspapers are now so full of Government documents, that there is scarcely room for any other news whatever. The subscribers are beginning to complain.

Respecting the robbery at Mr. Vesper's, we hear that the servant of the house was the principal thief. He is at present in Santa Fe, but the police are after him. It appears that one of the robbers, who made the false key of the safe, was let in by the servant five times early in the morning to try and fit it to the lock.

We regret to hear that one of our countrymen in the partido of the Fortin has met with a rather serious loss in the last storm, which it may be remembered occurred in the middle of the night; his sheep were blown into the arroyo, and out of three thousand sheep only some five or six hundred were saved. Several corrales were blown down, and at one place troughs were swept several squares from the house.

Another frightful murder by one of Flores' men we hear of. Passengers who have arrived from Canelones state that two ruffians, belonging to Flores' gang, attacked one of the Guardia Nacional, who was accompanying a foreigner who was travelling along the road called las Piedras. The murderers wore no ribbon or "divisa," and de-

manded the guardia nacional why he wore the blue ribbon. He replied that he was in the service of the government. They at once attacked the unfortunate man with long knives and perforated the poor fellow's body; they then fired off a blunderbuss at the foreigner and wounded him severely. The guardia nacional is dead, but the foreigner is recovering.

We hear of a rather important sale of land by the Government of Cordova to a foreign merchant in this city. One thousand square leagues at the rate of two hundred silver dollars per league.

This is, we suppose, the largest sale of lands ever known in the River Plate.

The sale of lands in Santiago at thirty shillings the square league, has been stopped, we hear, by order of the Provincial Government.

The greatest interest is now taken in provincial lands. We know that a leading Glasgow house has given orders to invest £200,000 in Cordovan and Santa Fe lands. Besides this, we may state that a certain gentleman has received instructions from a Glasgow merchant to send all information by return mail respecting provincial lands, as his correspondent intends investing some £30,000 in this description of property.

All persons having claims against the ward room officers of the Forte are notified to send the same in forthwith, as she leaves for England immediately. The French liner Georgina has arrived in Montevideo, with an assorted cargo of immense value.

We understand that the Bombay is the name of the British war vessel which is to replace the Forte. She was to have left England on the 7th April.

The screw steamer Galileo, of 1625 tons, was launched on the 7th of April. This, we believe, is the third steamer which has been built by the new company for the River Plate trade. She was built for Messrs. Lamport, Holt, and Co., and Messrs. Rathbone, Bros. and Co. The Messrs. Leslie have two other steamers from the same line, the Herschel and Ptolemy.

Our subscribers in Chascomus will please take notice that Messrs. Wylie and Co. are now our agents in that quarter. We hope that the papers will now be delivered more regularly than heretofore.

There is a rumour through town that great desertions have taken place in General Moreno's army. We rather think, however, that it is a *bolita*.

The new Insurance Company, 'La Bien Hechura del Plata' has been successful in disposing its shares as the Argentine Central Railway Company; all the shares are disposed of, and we are told that there have been five hundred more shares issued, which could have been disposed of at par. This is a good sign—we like to see Life Insurance Companies taking root amongst us, as it proves that we are becoming a provident people. The following gentlemen compose the Board of Directors:

We are happy to confirm our assertion of yesterday, that neither Monday nor Tuesday is a holiday. Mr. Wells makes his first ascent to-morrow, and we hear of two or three gentlemen anxious to accompany him, but for the expense. He asks 5000 dol. mpc for a ticket for the aerial voyage, as the additional quantity of gas makes it much dearer. The first time he will go alone.

Tuesday will be the 45th birthday of Her most gracious Majesty Queen Victoria. We hope our colleagues will not forget to salute so happy an anniversary.

Among the news by last packet, we find the following:—"The estate of Baronald, near Lanark, in which is situated the picturesque Cartland Craigs, has just been purchased by Mr. Robert Kerr, late of Buenos Ayres, for £6,500."—(Scotsman).

We are glad to welcome back the Messrs. Klappenback who arrived from San Juan yesterday: they are said to give most flattering accounts of Major Rickard and the mines: we will publish their diary of travels some day this week.

The State Bank reports four millions of dollars mpc profits during the past four months, equal to £7,600 per month. He would be a clever financier who could tell us who is enriched by these profits. Who are the shareholders?

The great Progress Ball will come off to-night: we hear that the saloons are two small for the immense concourse of fashion. In future no person is to be admitted members, unless having at least two grown-up daughters.

The actual number of bachelors is alarming. A French gentleman was robbed yesterday, of 3000 patacons, which he had left in his desk.

There was no gas in town last night owing to an accident to the principal tube. This caused very great inconvenience.

### CONGRESS.

The Deputies were occupied on Friday with the question of Dr. Camerino's election as member for Corrientes. The committee advised his rejection, on the grounds of want of residence, but he appealed to the House, showing that (except a short stay at San Pedro, Buenos Ayres) he had lived more than two years at Corrientes. The debate was postponed till next session, probably after the holidays.

The Senators have agreed to make Mr. Blas Pico a General, but the cocked hat has yet to go to the other Chamber. The members are quite enchanted with the photograph of the Traction Engine 'Buey.' Sor. Blanco arrived from Mendoza yesterday, and in a few hours after he presented his diploma, took the oaths and was admitted to the Senate. The Memorial of the Foreign-office will be read in this Chamber on Monday, if Congress sits so soon.

### Opening of the Franco-Argentine Theatre.

On Friday evening, 20th inst, the old Teatro Argentino was re-opened under most favorable auspices, by the French Bouffes. The house since the celebrated Mangi Concert has been devoted to profane purposes, having lately served as a Custom-house depot. M. D'hot and Mme Pauline resolved to restore it to dramatical uses. Considerable labor and expense were involved in the effort, but the success has been very brilliant, the theatre being fitted up with great taste, and we have no doubt it will leave the Victoria far behind.

An immense concourse filled the edifice before the hour fixed for the performance, and seats could not be obtained even at double prices. The boxes were filled with the *élite* of our city, President Mitre and the French Minister honoring the place with their presence; we noticed only a few English. The audience numbered at least a thousand, and we have in record a graceful compliment by the company, who presented bouquets to each of the ladies in the *cazuela*.

The curtain rose displaying the whole Co., who entered the Argentine National Hymn with much feeling, but the chorus was not very effective. The *Marseillaise* was then loudly called for, and the spirit-stirring strains given with enthusiasm, the audience joining in the refrain "Aux armes citoyens." It would be impossible to recount the various pieces of extravagant mirth and drollery which kept the house in a continued roar of laughter during the performance.

The first piece was a kind of prologue, touching the restoration of the Teatro Argentino, by the French Company. The text was ably converted into local allusions, including M. Pulicere, the decorative painter, and M. Landois, of the steers saw-mill: it was the composition of our neighbour, M. Zimmerman, the carpenter. The extravaganzas on Italian operas were highly amusing, and it is difficult to say whether M. Pauline, or M. D'hot carried off the palm, while the other members of the company most ably supported their parts.

It cannot be denied that the Bouffes offer a new source of amusement, which will cause an active competition with the opera and dramatic companies. The rent of their theatre is 9,000 dol. mpc per month, under a contract for ten years, and the situation so advantageous that the talents of our French friends will be nowise "like a candle under a bushel." We give our allies a cordial salute, and assure them in the words of their prologue—

'Anglais, Allemands, Irlandais, Ecosais, Nous leurs donnerons toute notre pratique.'

### STOP THREE!

A most amusing incident occurred yesterday before the Bolsa. A black fellow who, it appears, is a noted thief, coolly mounted the splendid 'overo' horse of a dashing produce broker, and was coolly trotting off when the owner espied him. He at once raised the cry of *stop thief!* and as the street was full the fellow was at once stopped, but he threw himself from the horse and escaped on foot.

This black fellow is, we hear, the terror of all the Doctors in town; he is now, however, so well known that we hope the police will succeed in catching him.

### FRIGHTFUL MURDER.

Sor Aldo was assaulted.

We regret that it is our painful duty to record another frightful murder, which was perpetrated in the partido of San Vicente on Friday night.

We have not as yet been favored with the particulars. The name of the unfortunate victim is Aldo, who is brother to a well-known city resident. The murderer who was Sor Aldo's own capataz, as a matter of course, escaped.

### ANOTHER ATTEMPT.

Our mercantile readers will have to be on their guard, as there has arrived recently in the River Plate a distinguished individual, who recently fled from Brazil, where he perpetrated the most wholesale frauds.

The following letter has been handed to us by one of the leading merchants in this city, with a request to call public attention to the matter—

British Consulate, Bahia,  
Feb. 18, 1864.

Sir,

I believe it may be interesting to the victims of the fraud practised by Sowya Riesenberger and Co., of this city, in the case of the Peruvian barque Maria, to acquaint you that I have received information, from a trustworthy source, that Riesenberger, the absconding partner of that firm, is now at Buenos Ayres, under the assumed name of 'Meyer,' and that he appears inclined to settle there, having left the United States, to which country he had absconded, on the discovery of his villainy.

As I believe Brazil has a treaty of extradition with the River Plate States, the London Commercial firms victimised by that man may, perhaps, desire to bring him to justice.

Knowing, however, none of those gentlemen, I have taken the liberty to make this communication, through you, in the hope that you will be so good as to bring it to their notice.

### LATEST FROM THE PROVINCES.

#### ARRIVAL OF THE PAVON.

The Pavon arrived in port yesterday morning, bringing in files from the interior.

The 'Ferro-Carril' of Rosario, comments upon the President's speech, and calls particular attention to his Excellency's comments upon Provincial Governments meddling in elections.

Our colleague refers to the President's remarks, relative to the necessity of changing the form of government, and making it more *central* (in 'Standard' phrase, abolishing 'all the Provincial Governments) and states that his Excellency's remarks were strictly constitutional.

From Jujuy we learn that Sr. Araoz is greatly liked, and that his government is preserving order in that distant country.

From Salta we gather that politics are at a fever heat, and some ruffians who prowl about the *camas* keep the place in great alarm. Governor Uriburu will soon have to resign his chair of office, as his time is nearly up, but no one knows who will be his successor.

In Tucuman everything is quiet—the people were called upon by the Government to elect Provincial Senators and Deputies.

In Santiago the greatest order prevailed, but the Ferro-carril attacks the Taboadas as despots.

In Cordova, the Indians are again becoming troublesome: another invasion has taken place in the Rio 4. Baigorria states that they did no damage.

There is a regiment of Colonels at present in Cordova, making the greatest disturbance; their only business seems to be collecting their salaries.

### ESTANCIEROS FOR SANTA FE.

There is a constant stream of people, with capital, coming from the neighboring provinces of Buenos Ayres to buy land in this province.

Yesterday three or four people arrived, amongst them two Englishmen with capital.

There is also a constant influx of sheep, crossing the Arroyo del Medio looking out for pasture, as the past unfortunate year has forced hundreds of sheep farmers to turn their attention to the fertile camps of Santa Fe. This is going ahead. Filling the camps with emigrants and flocks must prove a vast advantage to the commercial community, and will go far to disprove the ridiculous and absurd ideas of the residents of Buenos Ayres on the subject of the insecurity of Santa Fe.

This province, at the present moment, is the most quiet, the most safe, and the best governed of all the fourteen which compose the Confederation.—Ferro-Carril.

### ENTRE RIOS.

The 'Uruguay' newspaper says that the river has fallen so much that the steamer Salto was detained at Concordia, and that the Frigate had got aground near the Isla Rica, and the passengers were obliged to be transhipped to the Colon.

The same newspapers brings a serious charge against the steamer Era; it accuses her, on her first trip, of having carried on to Salto the correspondence intended for Concepcion. The newspapers are entirely barren of news of any kind, except the rules of the public schools, which may no doubt be very interesting to Patresfamilias, but the general public don't much care about the subject—and some official documents appointing some man or another to purge, clean and dose the police.

### INFAMOUS ADVERTISEMENTS.

Montevideo, May 19th 1864.

To the Editors of the 'Standard,'  
Sirs,  
Knowing 'Fair Play' to be a favorite motto with you, I feel confident, that a little of your space, which I know is valuable, will be allotted to the following remarks.

In your edition dated 12th instant appears an advertisement, which was entered by a tradesman in this place in one of the native papers. Then come a few remarks of your own on the scandal of this advertisement, and it is to these remarks I wish to direct your attention, but, in order to make the matter more explicit, I will detail the case.

The little girl mentioned happened to call at the tradesman's shop, and, we'll say inadvertently took away a silk handkerchief. This handkerchief being missed, and being seen by the tradesman in the residence of the Consul mentioned in the advertisement, of course the said Consul was desired to pay for it, or else return it. Neither however was done, not even after three applications, but instead the Consul called at the tradesman's shop, and used such language as to try to intimidate the tradesman when he threatened to advertise. In consequence of this attempt at intimidation the tradesman determined to advertise, and forthwith sent off to the newspaper office, and has been applauded by all men in Montevideo, who know the facts of the case, for so doing.

I think from the above explanation you will see that the advertisement was not so scandalous as you call it, and that the tradesman was perfectly justified in so acting, as far as the Handkerchief's value, I suppose, if all the inhabitants of Buenos Ayres, and Montevideo, were to take one from the shop, it would have as much effect as a puff of wind on a rock.
