THE SOUTH AMERICAN REPUBLICS.

Republics are at a discount, and since their initiation those of South America have never reached par. Statesmen have puzzled themselves to discover whether the failure was attributable to those who made the experiment, or inherent in the system. We should be inclined to lay the blame on both; although so many arguments may be adduced *pro* and *contra*, that we will content ourselves with remarking that not one single republican of the most enthusiastic patriotism could regard the praises of South American Governments, and denunciation of "rotten European monarchies," so freely uttered on last Sunday, as anything better than vulgar *bores*.

None better than Argentines know the tiresome chronicle of civil wars, revolutions, invasions, tyranny, exile, crime, disorder, and lawless violence of every kind which constitute the history of Spanish republics for the last fifty years. These countries seemed to have forbidden the approach of the civilization of the 19th century, and resolved on a plan of self-destruction, at the same time accusing the mother-country of having given them a bad education.

Their natural resources were stupendous, witness the Peruvian Government extracting every year Three Millions £ sterling from the Chincha islands. Yet what progress have these republics made? comparatively none! for there is not one on a level with any of our English Colonies. Why, all the republics from Mexico to Cape Horn are collectively a mere trifling compared to Canada, India, or Australia. Think you that if Bessford had held his ground in B. Ayres, we should now be hourly troubled with Indians, or suffer the paper money epidemic, or go begging for a railway, or cross the Andes on mules? Look at Melbourne! its streets are drained and paved; thirty years ago it was a swamp, and now it is the Paris of the Southern hemisphere. Look at Canada! and its Grand trunk railway: when will Peru or La Plata boast a Victoria Bridge to rival the Pyramids or Chinese Wall of antiquity? Look at India, with the gigantic fruits of civilization grafted on the empire of the Mogul. But it would require volumes to recite the splendid development of the Colonies belonging to one of those "rotten monarchies" denounced by Messrs. Bilbao, Varela & Co.

Aesop vividly paints human vanity (of which Dumas complained to D. Hector Varela), in the fable of the Ox and the Frog. Our republicans talk of throwing down the gauntlet to all the powers of Europe, when they are actually unable to defend themselves from a handful of naked Indians. In that country "on whose dominions the sun never sets" they are happily ignorant of the awful threat levelled against them, for the British Parliament all but ignores the existence of these republics, which it once called into creation. Lord Palmerston will not be alarmed at Mr. Varela's universal declaration of war, nor will the Emperor Napoleon change his ministry because Sor Bilbao is bilious. But it were well for the Retro orators if they had only spoken absurdities; their orations were moreover, offensive and impolitic.

Judge of the surprise which all classes of foreigners experienced when they went to express their sympathies for Peru, and were told that Europe is not yet emerged from barbarism, and that all Europeans are helots. It is not necessary that only republicans be friends to South American Independence, nor is it very clear that republic means Liberty. Nay there are thousands of Argentines ready to fight against foreign aggressors, who are virtually heartily sick of republics and conscientiously prefer an European form of Government.

Of the meeting had confined themselves to enlist sympathies for Peru without throwing dirt at their friends, the result would have been better. Great Britain, as President Mitre says, has always been the best friend to South America, and if her good-will be

conciliated there is no cause to fear, for Admiral Warren can lend more 'moral' weight (100 pounder Armstrongs) than all the republics together. Pinzon may laugh at the Retro demonstration but an English broadside carries powerful arguments. Let our stump orators then refrain from talking of "rotten monarchies" and the grand theories of "no crown, no church, no aristocracy" &c. otherwise they will only make the continent a subject of ridicule, like the quondam Empire of Soulouque.

BRAZIL AND MONTEVIDEO.

For some time previous to the Sarai mission, the Oriental Government, had hoped for signal assistance from its Imperial neighbor, and the press of Montevideo made the Cabinet of Rio Janeiro act as a counterpoise to that of B. Ayres; since the latter aided the filibusters. At one time the Brazilians were coming in force to crush the rebels at another they had placed a military cordon on the frontier to prevent the fugitives of Flores' army from escaping. Meantime the rebels were receiving countenance and supplies, from Brazil, and it was evident that the Imperial policy was, to flatter both combatants, until a pretext should arise for interfering and imposing its will on the exhausted republic.

When Sar Saraiya started for Montevideo charged with formidable commands, the mask was thrown off, and the Brazilian Cabinet, in reply to the Argentine Minister (Sor Marmol), declared that this was the last *amicable* step of the Imperial Government. Hardly had the Brazilian fleet dropped anchor at Montevideo when the envoy commenced his demands. The murder of Brazilian subjects, unpunished by the authorities, was a plea for proposing that Tacuarembó and some other river ports should be occupied by Brazilian garrisons, a concession beyond the power of Pres Mitre's Government, and an abdication of independence.

We will not enter into the alleged outrages, which made such noise in the Brazilian Chambers, nor defend the Oriental authorities; but much allowance must be made for a country in civil war, and it is strange that Brazil should adopt the same vigorous policy towards Montevideo, which she condemned in the case of G. Britain, respecting the Prince of Wales shipwreck. It is notorious that Brazilians formed the bulk of Flores' filibusters and therefore forfeited all right to protection from their Government.

Nevertheless Sor Saraiya had a pretext for bullying the Oriental republic, and his ultimatum being rejected, he broke off all relations with President Aguirre's cabinet. That matters had come to a serious crisis, there can be no doubt, for it has been necessary to call in the mediation of the British Minister at Buenos Ayres, the Argentine Secretary of Foreign Affairs, and Sor Lamas Oriental ex-minister at Rio Janeiro.

The coincidence of Pinzon's seizure of the Chincha islands and Maximilian's departure for Mexico seemed to augur badly for the unhappy Oriental republic, as if Brazil meant to annex Montevideo. We confide, however, in the resolution of England and France to maintain intact the independence of Banda Oriental.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

One of the most important inventions of the day is the most application of Kerosene. Coal will henceforward be no longer used on board steamers, as Kerosene has been already tried and found equally effective. A company has been formed in New York for the purpose of carrying out the experiment and adopting all the Hudson River boats to the Kerosene Gas Company. Our readers may imagine the importance of this discovery when they learn that it is calculated for a Transatlantic steamer the saving each trip will be 77,000 francs.

The following are the names of the Oriental forgers:—Bautista Mourat, Beltrand Grand, Francisco Grand, Pablo Belbrand y Valles, Santiago Bonifacio Manuel, Vila y Circos, y Leonor Balcar. These fellows had forged bills to an enormous amount, of the Commercial Bank. They are now on trial.

One of the most important trials before the courts of Montevideo is that of Edmund Lyons, who committed suicide some time since. We suppose the question is as to the disposition of his effects.

An English gentleman of Montevideo well known in Buenos Ayres, has subscribed for ten shares of the Argentine Central Railway Company. We believe he is the only subscriber to the stock in that city.

The Senate has at last decided the great Marmol question, which was brought before the house by Dr. Alsina. Sor Marmol has received liberty to attend to his diplomatic cares in Rio Janeiro.

The Fairy has made, we believe, the quickest trip on record between Montevideo and Buenos Ayres, in less than nine hours.

The River Uruguay has risen considerably during the last week: it is to be hoped that the recent rain has caused it to rise still higher.

Minister Marmol, we hear, is expected back from Rio per next packet. We wonder why he returns so soon.

The Brazilians, it is said, demand possession of Tacuarembó, and that their squadron shall, until the termination of the revolution, hold Colonia, Pray Bentos, Paysandu, and Salto. As a matter of course, these terms were at once flatly refused.

President Mitre, it is said, has become quite nervous about the Brazilian and Oriental question. Had his Excellency read the 'Standard' he would not have slept so long on a matter which is of the highest importance to this republic.

The Flores Committee, we are told, are in a great fright about Brazil. It is generally believed that Brazil will take possession of the whole of that republic, and hang up all the Flores men caught.

Young Flores, who embarked on the 1st of June for Pray Bentos, swears fire and murder against the Brazilians, and states that he will do all he can with his father to bring about an arrangement with the Government—that Orientals ought now unite and crush Brazil. The juvenile Flores states that if his father wished to be a broker he could, but that at present he has other fish to fry.

Sor, Delbar has again commenced the saladero business at Goya, and is killing fast. The people in Corrientes were greatly rejoiced to find the saladero again working. Fat novillos for saladeros at 55 Bolivianos.

In Parana there was renewed animation, owing to the opening of a new saladero. We are told that no less than ten foreign vessels are in that port at present. Cattle are very abundant in this locality, and Sor, Carbó, the new saladerista, will be apt to make good returns out of his saladero.

In the province of Jujuy, we hear, there is a great scarcity of labour. Any Europeans who can make their way up to this distant province will probably make their fortunes.

It rained the whole of Monday night, and a farmer from the south represents the state of the roads as frightful. Those parties who have supplied themselves with Mr Vandevell's portable corals, which can be moved in an hour, have had reason to rejoice, as the mud in the old corals is something frightful, and any flock stuck in loses three-fourths of its lambs.

We hear that the contractors of the Northern Railway leave by the next or following packet. We cannot permit them to depart without calling attention to the fact that Messrs Murray and Mills have realized what before their advent was but a dream. We hope that they will soon return to carry on the road to Las Conchas and Zarate.

One of the most amusing features respecting the Peruvian question is Mr. La Fuente's offer to write poetry for the cause. Unless to throw ridicule on the whole affair, we certainly cannot see any other object the poet can have in view. We suppose we will hear of Poster next: he will probably offer to write international articles for the same cause. We wonder people have not more sense.

The editors of the 'Nacional,' notwithstanding their extraordinary patriotism, made no show at all at the Peruvian meeting. We believe, however, their absence was not ilt. This splenetic colleague is most indignant at the news we published about Mr. Sarmiento in Chile, and has the audacity to contradict it. Meanwhile the news is perfectly correct. Mr. Sarmiento has made a claim which the Chileans refuse to acknowledge, and which we have strong reason to doubt the Argentine Government will ever be able to collect.

A brilliant party took place the other night in Barracas; all the haut ton of that middle locality were there. It was one of the grandest balls that ever was given in Barracas.

A rather ludicrous case occurred the other day in one of our country towns. It appears that the justice of the peace in the town in question has a large wholesale store, which is greatly patronized by Irishmen. By some fatal fat got into a row, about politics. The discussion began to get animated, when the Irishman, indignant at some observation of his worship, gave him a trip, and down came the beak. A few of the bystanders rushed to the assistance of the fallen judge, but the Irishman

came right at him then, and but that one of the young men interposed a small bag of biscuits, a collision would inevitably have taken place between the Irishman's hand and the judge's eye. Happily however his worship escaped, but we regret to say our pugilistic countryman got put in the stocks. The judge, however, who is a really good fellow, on receiving an apology discharged the Irishman on his own recognizance, and refused to fine him one paper dollar.

The Telegraph lines are being laid down between the Villa Luxan and town, and will be ready for the "electric spark" in a few weeks.

A farmer from Lobos called on us yesterday to say that the camps are splendid in that neighborhood, and the sheep farmers doing well. There have been no sales of sheep of late, and very few new comers make their appearance in that flourishing partido.

An Irish gentleman has arrived in this city, who, we understand, has £23,500 in cash, and a property worth fifteen hundred a year at home besides. We understand that he is about to invest in lands in Entre Rios, Santa Fe and Cordova. We hear that he intends to take up Mr. J. G. Kemslay, the great provincial land agent, along with him to the provinces, to see the different estates offered him for sale.

A vessel has arrived with the first batch of a regiment (500) of Italians, hired by the National Government. We think it would be wiser for President Mitre to engage some Swiss, the latter being generally tradesmen, who could usefully employ themselves when their service expired.

Captain Mansilla has resigned the post of Secretary to the Friends of Peru: it does not appear this is from any quarrel with the Society, but probably from private arrangements.

As a sign of the times, a book store has been opened at Baracas (S), which village will soon be connected with town by rail (Great Southern, 1st section).

We notice the formation of a Pastoral Joint Stock Company in this city, the particulars whereof we will try to learn.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

In consequence of the number of officers constantly arriving from the army in Montevideo, the President has decreed that no officer or soldier shall be permitted to leave his regiment without permission from the government.

Government spies who have been in the rebel camp at Tala state that on the 28th the rebels were concentrating their forces, Suarez, Manduca, and Borges have got their men all together.

The Government army is following and has taken up its position on the banks of the Tala, where the camps are in a superior condition.

On the 30th ult. there was a slight scrimmage, resulting in favor of the Government troops. Two live rebels were caught. Col. Aparicio started off in the night to wake up the Regenerators, and the next morning the whole Government force marched in the same direction to support him.

M. Jas. Fair, not having time to bid all his friends adieu, previous to leaving for Europe, has put a valedictory notice in the Reforma.

Col. Lengua was at the head of the cavalry, but when the enemy heard of his approach they made off, with all speed, and never stopped until they got to the other side of the Yi. They took along with them one cannon and two carts, and about a hundred drenched cavalry soldiers on foot.

We perceive that the Minister has ordered the words to be proved which are contained in some answers sent in by Mr. James Bell. We are utterly ignorant of the matter, or what it refers to.

Flores, it appears, is still in the partido of Colonia. On the 1st inst, he was encamped at Martin Chico. Flores, it appears, has now commenced killing sheep. Formerly he kept his men with cattle, but now he prefers sheep. We read that he has taken some two thousand fine mestiza sheep for his hungry followers.

A lot of soldiers belonging to Laguna's regiment were taken by the man Flores. The poor fellows had gone to see their families and were caught in their own houses. What a lamentable condition for a country!

M. Calvo has written a powerful article on the Brazilian question. We regret that our paper is so small we have no room to publish it, but it is well worthy the perusal of President Mitre, for it contains many bitter truths.

The Gas Company has at last commenced to lay down tubes in Calle 25 de Mayo. The residents are in the greatest gloom, as formerly there was no passing down this street on a dark night. The beautiful and gifted Miss Estrada has been presented with a magnificent Album by the gentlemen of Montevideo, into which is copied the delightful air from 'Semiramide' which she so exquisitely sung at the concert.

The French transport 'Euryale' arrived from Brest en route for the Pacific.

The shares of the Commercial Bank are looked for, but there are no sellers. The consolidated debt is quoted at 80. The French and English debt is quoted at 56 1-2.

The International debt is quoted at 46. Money is abundant and good names discount at 1 per cent per month and under.

The capital of the London and River Plate Bank in Montevideo is stated to be four millions seven hundred thousand patacones.

Mr. Ruding, we regret to hear, leaves shortly for England. He has no ambition to be a broker in Buenos Ayres, like his predecessor.

Awful Atrocities in the Banda Oriental.

We regret to say that we read in the 'Reforma' an unfortunate Frenchman has been staked out alive, at his own residence in Belen, by order of a fellow called Fausto Aguilar. The only motive alleged for this inhuman act was, that the unfortunate monsieur refused to give up some five or six horses to him. After staking the Frenchman out in his own patio, the rebels took the poor man's horses: and yet there is a French Minister in the River Plate.

On the same authority, we learn that a countryman of Admiral Pinzon's named Luis Dominguez, a shopkeeper in Palma Sola, has been so persecuted by the Flores' rebels, that he has been obliged to shut up his house, leave his business, and fly to Brazil. As this occurred before the news from Peru was known, it cannot be attributed to American animosity to Spain.

A Brazilian, named Michael Bando, who was proceeding with his carts to Uruguayana, was attacked by a gang of Flores' men at the Palomas. The poor Brazilian was frightfully wounded, one of Flores' chief officers, named Gregorio Baez, having first tried to cut his throat.

A German, named John Newman, a respected and industrious resident of Salto, a stonecutter, was murdered in the most brutal manner, on the coast of the Catalan, by a Brazilian soldier serving under Flores.

A Brazilian Mulatto was murdered also on the estancia of Leandro Gomer, by some soldiers of Flores. He was assassinated simply because he was capataz of the estancia.

A Brazilian has been fined five hundred patacones in Tacuarembó, by a fellow named Lucas Vergara, who is secretary of Gregorio Suarez.

We call the attention of our Foreign Ministers to the foregoing frightful atrocities perpetrated by the officers and men of an acknowledged rebel. These particulars we have extracted from the 'Reforma,' and as full particulars are given, we have every reason to believe they are correct.

HIGHLY IMPORTANT

FLORES IN THE MUD

An Englishman, recently arrived from the Banda Oriental, has called to say that north of the river Negro there is not a single rebel to be found, and that the estancieros in that quarter are praying to Heaven for the rain, as they say if it rains heavily for a few days the revolution will get completely 'washed out.' It appears that during the last few weeks it has rained rather heavily, and poor Flores and his men have suffered the most extreme hardships. All loyal Orientals are therefore anxious for a continuance of bad weather. Every day the 'regenerators' are diminishing in number. One of the leaders addressed a most feeling speech to his men the other day, and commenced—"Muddy followers, I regret that you should experience such hardships, but as we are told that 'the muddy path leads to glory,' so the muddy one leads to hell. The influence of the weather has made you in appearance 'blancos,' but in the heat of summer you will, no doubt, again be 'colorados.' Regard the mud in which you sleep as the feather-bed of liberty; the elements are against us, but let us have elements of our own. Our informant, who overheard this astute scavenger's address, states that it is keeping raining for a few days, there is an end to the revolution.

ANOTHER SHIPWRECK

Yesterday a chasque arrived in town, conveying the news of the loss of the Italian barque Hydra, on the coast of Ensenada. This vessel, we believe, was bound from Genoa to Buenos Ayres, and had a valuable assorted cargo, besides a number of passengers on board. The passengers were landed, and the chasque which arrived states that the camps in that direction are completely flooded. Several of the arroyos are so full, that he had to swim them.

Where the passengers are landed, is a bleak, inhospitable spot, but as the chasque came away on the moment, he could not state what chances there were for getting the vessel off. We believe that last night a boat was despatched to her assistance.

EXTRAORDINARY DEATH

One of the most extraordinary causes of death we have read of, is in a recent number of the 'Reforma':—Maximilian, King of Bavaria, has died suddenly, and it appears his death was caused by his inadvertently sticking a gold brooch into his skin whilst dressing one morning. The wound was so slight, that he paid not the slightest attention to it. Suddenly his breast became inflamed, crystals set in, and the unfortunate monarch was carried away almost instantaneously, so sudden was the attack. People should be careful henceforward in wearing brooches, since it has cost already the life of a monarch.

Workings of the Saladeros in the Present Year.

From information we have gathered we can affirm that the saladero workings of this year amount to the following:—
Saladeros of the Rivers, (Oriental coast, Entre Rios and Parana), 600,000 head.

So that we have workings to the amount of 1,630,000 head, which, calculated at 120 per lb., valued one with another on account of the small weight this year, owing to the animals being so poor, they produce 2,038,000 quintals. Last year the amount was:

In Habana 600,000 quintals.
In Brasil 1,200,000 "

1,800,000

There therefore remains the surplus of 228,000 quintals over last year's amount. Admitting that the English market consumes the 140,000, which have been shipped and are still shipping, yet we have a surplus of 88,000 quintals for which there is no market, and this will undoubtedly diminish the actual value of the article.—[Tribuna.

RIO NEGRO MAILS.

The Sack of Montevideo and San Carlos.

We have dates from Mercedes to the 5th inst. The 'Eco' of the 29th ult. publishes a letter with the following narrative:—"While I was in San Carlos a band of filibusters entered the town. The ruffians found the notary, Gervacio Pazo, at the billiard-room, and beat him severely; they robbed all the shops of dry-goods, &c., taking whatever they wanted, and paying no body. Don Armando Rodriguez lost over 1,000 silver dollars, and others in proportion. A few days ago they made a descent on this town (Maldonado) and ordered an Italian named Jose Vicente to give up all the cloth, valies, &c., in his shop, but he refused, whereupon a picket of rebels was placed at his door, and he was summoned before the filibuster Borges to answer for his conduct. A committee has been named to levy all kinds of supplies and we cannot resist. If Government does not send us a garrison we shall be in a bad way."

In the department of Salto, Colonel Raba fell on a band of 60 rebels and routed them, killing 1, and taking one prisoner. A strong column left Salto for the districts North of Arapey, in quest of the filibuster Santana who was prowling about there. Colonel Laguna states "that the rebels are no longer in sight of Colonia; Flores entered the village of Rosario, appointed the authorities, and left on the 28th ult. His troops were robbing and murdering wherever they went, and Larroba with 100 men went to sack Carmelo, but I detached forces to its relief, the Volunteer battalion having arrived here (Colonia) 28th inst. The Government army is at Puntas San Juan, en route for Guayreud to hem in Flores. Capt Castro is cruising along the coast to prevent rebel supplies from Buenos Ayres."

EDUCATION OF ARGENTINES

Having been honored with the accompanying letter, by the worthy Rector of the University, and being convinced that there are certain sentiments, which besides being highly flattering to my son, Fausto, may be of utility to the Argentine youth, I will be much obliged if you should find a place in your valuable paper for it.

Sr. Don Francisco Carulla.

Dear Sir,
I have had the pleasure to receive your polite note, and the accompanying printed slips, which I now return after perusal.

I congratulate you cordially for the satisfaction which you must experience for the advancement of your son Facundo, because nothing is so grateful to the heart of a father, as to see himself rewarded and worthily represented in the world by the heir of his blood and name. You have made the fittest selection for the future career of your son, because as he is to establish himself and live in South America, nothing can better engage his talent or his labour than the sciences whose powerful aid is so much required in these countries, where the scarcity of population renders more necessary the employment of these machines, which economise labour, and compensate the human forces, and where the variety of productions, rude and little known, require the application of physics, chemistry, geology, taken from the point of view of wealth, that is to say, of industry. On the other hand, the career of the engineer or the geometer, are more noble and satisfactory than those generally followed in our country, because they procure greater independence, and also a complete tranquillity of conscience. The physician, the lawyer, the clergyman, and the soldier, are frequently the targets for erroneous judgments from the public, because they are called upon by their profession to practice certain acts, respecting which the estimate of society is very diversified, either because it is blinded by interests or passions, or because these same acts are equivocal in what regards their opportunity and moral merit, and they are presented under diverse aspects to the judgment of the generality of people. It does not so happen with the proceedings of the sciences of application, because they are demonstrable by ratiocination until they become axioms, and from one experience to another until they become evidences; and men do not dispute about that which they can see. The most conscientious lawyer, either defending a client, or sentencing as a judge, cannot remain completely tranquil about his conduct, because his judgment has only taken into account merely moral and metaphysical elements; while the geometer has for his incorruptible and infallible judges, his compass, his algebraic formulas, which never permit an error, because mathematical is the height of absurdity. It might be believed that a man, after delivering himself exclusively to calculations and lines, and to the decomposition of inorganic things, should become materialized, and thus deprive his mind of those sweet emotions felt by those who can save the life or the fortunes of their fellow-beings, and also return the grace of their health undiminished by some disease; but this belief has no solid footing, because, besides that the mathematician more than any one else requires to bring into action his intellectual faculties which are the glory of man, and which above all things constitute him an image of his God. Being versed in the physical laws which constitute the creation, he has his soul constantly moved with the grandeur, the logic, and the wisdom of those laws, so universal that they govern by the same means the stone that is thrown by the sling of the savage, and the luminous orb which moves about in space. No! the moral emotions of the geologist are more intimate than those of the poet or the humblest or most fanciful aesthetic, as is proved by the history of the sciences. I remember having read a very curious anecdote, which just comes to my purpose, in the 'Memoirs of P. Arago,' relating to the great Newton. In the year 82 of the seventeenth century, Newton was endeavouring to get, I don't know what measure, of the extension of our planet, established by Picard, and he went over a calculation commenced by him some time back, according to the ancient data of Newton. Newton proposed to confirm himself as to whether the force which retains the moon in its orbit is that which impedes it or not from following a direction at a tangent, by virtue of the centrifugal force, and whether this was not, perhaps, the same force which causes bodies to fall on the terrestrial surface, diminished according to the square of the distance. In this instance the mathematical calculations justified his suspicions, with which that eminent geometer experienced great joy, and this coincidence produced in him such a nervous excitement that he could not personally rectify the numerical operations, which were very simple, and was obliged to have recourse to one of his friends. While treating on this subject, Arago observes that the tranquil occupations of science provides not only more durable emotions than the frivolous ones to be found in society, but that they are generally more intense and exquisite.

I have detailed myself too much in these considerations, which are perhaps foreign to a private and friendly letter, because they will contribute to confirm you more in your judgment in selecting a profession for your son, and this good judgment is likewise enhanced by your having sent your son to England, where, indisputably, more than in any of the old nations of Europe, the character of the people has a tendency to those studies which are immediately converted into happiness and wealth and contribute to develop the material forces, obtaining those mar-

vels of industrial production which reduced to figures show so eloquently the power and greatness of the United Kingdom.

The printed papers which you have communicated to me do not leave any doubt respecting the progress and application of your son, through which he has obtained the esteem of his masters and fellow students. I see by the yearly reports of the Scientific Society of the students of Manchester, that Facundo during the years 1863 and '64 has filled the appointment of member of the Committee of management of the society, which shows the good opinion they have formed of him and the degree of his advancement.

I also perceive that he has also been selected to write papers on certain difficult questions, as for instance, on the theory and application of the barometer, on the qualities and nature of carbonic acid, on galvanic batteries, on the geological effects of ice, on vegetables adapted for food, on the chemical analysis (spectroscopy) which is one of the most remarkable acquisitions of modern chemistry on the proper method of vast levellings and in fine on the history of steam-engines. If we consider that this implies considerable familiarity with the English languages, which is now a valuable acquisition, it also indicates that young Carulla has acquired a certain degree of self-possession which enables him to appear in public; this shows progress in a very principal branch of the education of young men, and which consists in presenting oneself with modesty and grace before educated persons; a thing for which Englishmen of good society are remarkable, without falling into affectation. The diversity of subjects, treated by your son shows the progress of studies in which he is engaged, a vast programme which comprises mechanics, physics, chemistry, geometry, land surveying and finally the study of man and of our race, since he has been elected a member of the Anthropological Society of London, and in which I see the names of many celebrated professors and English celebrities. Although these matters are so varied they are intimately connected and are indispensable for the technical education of the engineer, because it is a species of ignorance in a member of his profession, not to know more than one aspect of the matter which he is called to modify, the more so in the case of your son, who must apply his knowledge in countries where scientific labor is but little subdivided and where he who wants an indented wheel, for example, has to estimate the resistance of the wood which he is to employ, or to examine the nature of the earths in which it is to be cast if of iron.

I have expressed to a certain degree the reasons I have for congratulating you for the direction which you have given to the talents of your son, to remove from that congratulation, which is sincere, the semblance it might have of mere compliment.

If you have the pleasure of embracing your son during my days, tell him that I esteem him as a useful and laborious man, and that he may, like you, count upon my friendship, if worth anything.
