**Mr. Fair and the Central Railway**

Some six months ago it was currently rumored that our worthy Consul in London had intrigued against the great Argentine Enterprise—the Cordoba railway. This was openly stated in the *Argentine Herald*, and the strength of it the "Ferro-carriil" of Rosario very actually demanded Mr. Fair's dismissal from our Consular service.

It affords us the greatest satisfaction to be now duly authorised to contradict the disparaging statement. Mr. John Fair, we must learn that he has in question in his wrote to Mr. Sampson Argentine consul-general (who had shown himself a friend to Mr. Wheelwright's enterprise), requiring him to state to the Consul of the River Plate in the matter. "To this Mr. Sampson replied by a most honorable testimony that Mr. Fair not only was innocent of any kind of ill will or change, but had evinced in every possible way his decided interest for the successful issue of the great undertaking."

It is a statement based on our undoubted authority, coming from a gentleman whose name is identified with the Central Argentine railway, and we hope our colleagues will have the justice to give the same, in a spirit of good faith.

**Grand Colonization Scheme.**

We have seen the contract made by an Argentine capitalist with the Government of Cordoba, for the purchase of 100 square leagues (nearly 6 million acres) of public lands.

The price is left in blank, but we have no doubt the purchaser will be the purchaser chooses to bring out ten thousand emigrants in two thousand families suitable for farming occupations, at the rate of 50 families per league of land. The land is to be taken up in lots of four square leagues each. The emigrants shall be exempt from all military service, be permitted to farm a large quantity of land for their own defence. They shall be allowed to import implements, &c., duty free. They shall enjoy the fullest civil and religious liberties, and be subject to the national authorities.

Such is in brief the important scheme which has been ratified by the Governor and Legislature, and we learn that the concessionaire is about to leave for Europe, to arrange for soldiers and the emigrants. He cannot do better than give Ireland the preference, in which country he will find thousands of industrious poor people only too anxious to accept his offer.

**NONEVIDEO**

Saturday's papers contain little news, and our correspondent has not written to us. The concert at Soli's on Thursday evening, for benefit of the orphans, was a splendid affair, and the amateur singers merited the most enthusiastic applause. The house was crowded, and the performance commenced with the National Hymn played by Middlebury, Cassin, Petrazzani, Keropoulos and others. The songs were sung by Durand. The sisters Reyes played Rossini's Stabat Mater. Miss Estrazulus sang "Let us be happy together," and Miss Reyes played on the harp an air from Romeo and Juliet. At the conclusion of which she was presented with a dove bearing a wreath, the gift of Sor Escardo. Miss Casalla's cavatina was awarded a great success. Afterwards this lady had received a handsome bracelet from the English residents, for her singing at the last concert, for the British Hospital. Miss Estrazulus was crowned with laurel in triumph by the orchestra.

Letters from Colonia, 25th ult. state that a band of rebels was cut to pieces near the town of Santa Cruz, and a great division. There was much discontent among the soldiers, and the Government ordered to be returned having exempted all the rebels from the punishment of death. The chief of Police has been returned. Some of the filibusters have returned to B. Ayres.

The Spanish fleet of three frigates, expected Admiral Pizarro, is daily expected at Montevideo, en route for the Chinchina Islands. President Aguirre and the Minister of War arrived in the capital from Montevideo's head quarters, on Sunday evening, at 10 o'clock. They report the army most enthusiastic. Flores's scouts attempted to intercept them on their return, but were driven off by the Government troops, across the Santa Lucia.

Cattle-raiding has broken out in several departments. The Russian corvette "Faris" 24 guns, arrived from Cuba on route for the West coast.

The rules on this were of the most limited character, and the brokers nothing whatever doing on the Bolsa and with the exception of a few desultory remarks on Mr. Lamuz's last letter and the Government project there is not a topic on 'Change.

Mr. Cavenage got another Argentine capitalist to subscribe to the stock of the Central Railway this day—twenty shares. We cannot allow such an important fact to go unnoticed.

People are beginning to ask when will the next burning of the paper money take place. We suppose to day or to-morrow. If report be true there is a most monstrous burning of paper money in contemplation—ninety million livres. We do not altogether agree with the propriety of this step, as it will make paper scarce without supplying us with either foreign coin or any other equivalent.

We peruse in the circulars received per last packet, that the wool market in Havre is very firm. Prices for Montevideo wools and middle classes of Buenos Ayres have gone up, and these wools are much looked for.

Silas Brothers of Montevideo have engaged a general power of attorney to Mr. James Matthew.

The firm of Heissig and Martineau of Montevideo has been dissolved, the former having power to liquidate, also the firm of Messrs. E. Gowlard and Co. has been dissolved by mutual consent. The partners have had the winding up of the business.

The Russian schooner Piel, from Bremer, has arrived in Montevideo to receive Hermanns, with assorted cargoes. The cargoes of wine from Barcelona are arrived in Montevideo for Chibil y Alvarez, as the Montevideo market is overstocked.
