WANTED A TREATY.

The secretary for Foreign Affairs is at present editing a collection of the treaties made by the Argentine Confederation, or Buenos Ayres, with other States. The idea is not original, but rather a plagiarism, since Sor Calvo, Paraguayan Minister at Paris, has recently compiled all the treaties of the Hispano-American republics.

The compact of the English to evacuate Martin Garcia (1849) is obsolete, yet without intelligible; but the Treaty for suppression of slave-trade, with its numerous Annexes respecting all captures made by the Argentine Navy, borders on the ridiculous.

Instead of raking up these dusty parchments, our Minister of Foreign Affairs should apply himself to conclude a Treaty which would prove more useful than all hitherto executed: a compact with the republic of Chile for the protection of our horned cattle. It is notorious that the Indians, who dwell between Mendoza and Magellan's Straits, carry on a contraband traffic, stealing every Spring, thousands of fat cattle from the Argentine estancieros which they convey, by a Southern pass across the Andes.

Nevertheless we are confident the trans-Andine Government would readily listen to any official complaint on the part of our Minister. Instead of a South-American alliance against Napoleon, it would be more advisable to make common cause against the red men. The pass of the Cordillera, used by the Indian cattle-stealers is one of the best, having been lately discovered by a Lieutenant of the Chilean Army. It is situated very far South and could be effectually guarded by a picket of soldiers while the fruits of industry undergo a perilous and difficult journey through Uspallata or Portillo, the imbecility and neglect of the two Governments leave an easy exit to the Indian contrabandists.

Our cabinet thinks it does enough for the protection of Argentine industry by fomenting the Cordova railway, as if we must forego the idea of placing a barrier against Indian invasions, until this enterprise be completed. Meanwhile a dozen Argentine or Chilean custom-officers would suffice to secure us a large portion of our pastoral riches, and upon up a new high road for traffic. This would in a great manner check the invasions that we suffer in this province, by depriving the Patumpas of a market where thousands of B. Ayrean cattle have been heretofore disposed of. Chile often gives us a proof of friendship by sending timely news of projected Indian forays; we have just learned anticipation of an in-road on Rio Cuarto. It is manifest that united action is absolutely requisite for our common interests, and equally clear that Chile is ready to adopt any measures in this spirit, if our Minister will only pay less attention to diplomatic fossil-remains, and bestir himself for the exigencies of the hour.

ANOTHER S. AMER. CAN. WAR.

The curse of God would seem to have fallen on the Spanish Republics. Mexico is undergoing, at the hands of France, the same treatment which was found necessary in 1837 with the Algerian pschalic, Guatemala and San Salvador are cutting each other's throat for want of better employment. Ecuador threatens to invade Peru, the latter returning the compliment. The Argentine Republic presents a gloomy picture, in the interior. Flores' invasion of Banda Oriental presages a long and destructive war in the sister-state. Chile and Bolivia are now preparing to fight about some heaps of Guano near Atacama.

It may be little damage to Bolivia, entering into a foreign war, as three months scarcely pass without a revolution, every professor of President Acha having been either murdered or banished. But Chile has of late enjoyed the fruits of Peace, and exhibited a moral and material development which, although trifling in comparison to a British colony, is yet unparalleled in S. America.

The trans-Andine republic has derived immense riches from the deposits of Guano, on the Pacific coasts; which has excited its cupidity to dispute with Bolivia the treasures near Atacama. The latter is a bleak desert possessing the village of Cobija, the only sea-port of Bolivia, to which state these discoveries naturally belong. Nevertheless Chile is not content with her own, but anxious to strip a poorer neighbor, declares her resolution to sacrifice a hundred times the value, to the demon of War, for the sake of robbing the victor's nests.

THE CHILIAN MAIL.

We have the 'Ferro-carril' of Santiago up to 5th ult. The roads are so bad, that the mails now take double the usual time of transit. Mess. Mac Clure & Co. have opened a new bank in Santiago, with a capital of half-a-million dollars silver. Great frauds have been discovered in the Valparaiso central railway, implicating almost all the employees of the company. The Spanish residents gave a serenade to Admiral Pinzon, and the arrival of the other frigates is awaited for the proposed banquet. With reference to Mr. Wheelwright's new enterprise (Cordova railway) the 'Mercurio' hails it as a blessing to the Continent, but the 'Ferro-carril' says that the concessionaire has exacted a lion's share from the Argentine Government. Trade looks brisk at Concepcion and other Southern markets: corn maintains its price (20 to 22 rls). The industry of silk-worms is springing up. The Valparaiso and Santiago railway is finished, but not yet open for traffic, as the wire-fences are not completed. The feeling in Chile is not complacent. The feeling in Chile is that Napoleon's invasion of Mexico presages his alliance with the Southern Confederacy. A great discussion has arisen touching Sor Vicuña Mackenna's work on the ostracism of General O'Higgins. The Chilean navy is utterly demoralized, the Esmeralda is damaged, and not one good vessel afloat: it is proposed to raise the fleet superior to that of any other S. American state.

Another English war-steamers has arrived at Valparaiso: the theatre of that city is set up to Raffle, by the municipality. A politico-literary society called Union Liberal commenced its sessions: the first discussion was 'Religious Liberty.' The Spanish frigate 'Resolucion' made the voyage from Falkland Islands to Valparaiso in 25 days, Congress had but one Session of Senators and two of Deputies in a month, the members neglecting to form a quorum! The mortality of Santiago for the month of April was 673, rather more than Buenos Ayres, with half the population of the latter.

M. Menadier has published vol V. of trade-statistics. A ladies journal called, 'The Butterfly,' had just come out. The Engineer corps has been remodelled, and the improvement of highways progresses. The 'Ferro-Carril' has severe and merited strictures on the blood thirsty tone of the B. Ayrean press, which seeks to convert the Chief Magistrate into an executioner: it applauds Gen. Mitro's resolution to employ an army of railway laborers instead of armed legions, to suppress the rebels of the Interior.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

War is not over in Guatemala: it threatens to involve all the petty republics adjacent. Carrera, after his defeat at Contepaque, is more resolved than ever to vindicate his arms by falling again on San Salvador. The latter state has declared war against Nicaragua for abetting the tyrant of Guatemala, so that President Barrios is threatened on both sides, Honduras being his sole ally—Costa Rica is neutral, and labors to restore peace. New Granada is recovering from its late convulsions. A member of Congress proposed to repeal the confiscation-law passed on the fallen party, but this was rejected. The capital of the republic is to be transferred from Bogotá to Panamá.

An awful earthquake took place at Guatemala, extending also along the coast of Salvador; it lasted 2 minutes, with a slight undulation, ruining several villages, churches &c. and was caused by an eruption of the volcano Quetzaltenango; it left a large fissure in the port of S. Jose.

LATEST FROM THE INTERIOR.

ARRIVAL OF THE PAVON.

Another Victory!

The Pavon arrived early yesterday morning bringing us dates up to the 9th from Rosario: we extract the following from the 'Ferro-carril.' The forces of Col. Santos have obtained another victory over the rebels, who were commanded by Peñaloza in person. The following is part of Gen. Paunero's letter to the Government of Santa Fé.

It is with the greatest pleasure that I remit you the official statement of the engagement which took place on the 26th May, in a part of the Llanos called Loma Blanca, against the rebel leader Peñaloza in person. I hope before 3 days expire to continue my journey for San Luis, meanwhile, let me congratulate you on the glorious victory.

The statement of Governor Sarmiento respecting the engagement, is not very explicit. Santos is wounded in the leg, and 2 of his officers killed, and from this occurrence no doubt, the rumour concerning his death had its origin. Notwithstanding the victory of Santos over Peñaloza, the rebels succeeded in stealing all the horses from him. This is truly a guerrilla warfare; for notwithstanding all the victories, they are not so afraid for want of horses.

We should not be deceived by the language of the papers of the Interior. The Chacho soldiers beaten in one place take to flight, but join again at some other place, and the high-flown words of Sarmiento, regarding splendid victories and the country's prospects, lose their importance in consequence of the repeated attempts of the rebels. The official statement of Taboada, asserts that the Chacho's force are completely destroyed, whilst the Comandante Arredondo states that on the 15th May, Peñaloza was besieging the capital of Rio.

The following occurrence will explain the state of the Interior warfare. The rebels took one José Sanchez Arredondo, a female rebel prisoner and sent back the wife of a rebel named Ruiz. Now, we don't believe that the present rebellion is a serious matter, or likely to imperil the Republic; neither do we believe that Urquiza has anything to do with the rebellion. But, we believe that the authorities are ignorant of the true state of the Interior, and that scandalous acts are perpetrated in the name of the law by several Provincial Governors and officers. The Press of Chile has taken this matter up, and comments severely upon the acts of vengeance and retribution committed by the party in power. 'Sr Sarmiento is a good governor, honest man, and energetic in preserving peace: but he is the most incompetent man the Government could select to quell the rebellion. Santos and Arredondo are brave officers and loyal citizens, but they are the worst men in the country to extinguish the flame of sedition. Taboada is an excellent frontier chief, but he is just the man to cause a rebellion in any country, particularly when permitted to meddle with the affairs of the neighbouring provinces.

Vengeance brings vengeance, and blood brings blood, and it is a crying shame that, notwithstanding the liberal and humane conduct of the National Government, the war in the interior is carried on the most rampant and ferocious manner which

characterized the worst days of Rosas. We believe that the worthy Paunero and Rojo, and their two secretaries, will do more to quell the disturbance than even 2000 bayonets.

Now is the time to propose terms, to make peace, and to put an end to this useless bloodshed. Let us extinguish the thirst for vengeance which is demoralising the nation and emptying its coffers. The above remarks of the 'Ferro-Carril' are well worthy of attention.

THE HEAD OFFICE.

Yesterday the Head office was crowded again. Prisoners were brought in almost every five minutes: his worship could hardly hear all the cases on the list.

Business began by the court officer introducing an Argentine carrier, who was arrested for debt. Prisoner in his defence urged, that imprisonment for debt had been abolished long since in all civilized countries, and that it was a disgrace to Buenos Ayres and her Republican institutions, that a free and intelligent Argentine, should suffer incarceration for debt. Poverty should not be regarded as a crime, and if ounces only come down, he would soon pay his way.—Sent to debtor's prison.

An Italian carpenter and a sailor, had a slight difference the other night, as to the occupation of Nice—they were charged with fighting. Prisoners stated that politics invariably lead to rows, and that his worship should have some consideration as they were living in a country, where the only subject of conversation is politics. The judge did not seem to admit the plea of justification, and remarked that carpenters and sailors should not dare to meddle with politics. Such subjects should be left to Generals, Lawyers, Doctors, Editors, and Members of Congress (cheers) Prisoners remanded.

A chocolate manufacturer was next brought forward for being intoxicated. Prisoner stated that his chocolate was so strong that it got into his head, and as proof of the superior quality of his chocolate offered the judge a cup gratis, which his worship declined, stating he preferred maté.

An Oriental was brought up on a similar charge, but the prisoner put it to his honor if he deigned it a crime to get drunk on reading such stirring news of Flores as the Tribuna published. The judge replied that he regarded drunkenness as a crime always, but more particularly so, on the present occasion, as the 'spree' was got up to commemorate Flores the invader. Great cheers in the court.

Next came a baker charged with disorderly conduct: the ill-bred fellow was immediately unarched-off. An Englishman was then introduced, who, of course, could not speak one word of Spanish, nor understand the remarks of the court. The judge was greatly perplexed, the officers did their best by Argentine gesticulations to make our fellow-countryman understand the charge, but the prisoner appeared naturally dull. He was fined & unarched off.

A Spanish carpenter, 2 Brazilians, painters by trade, and an Argentine carman, were all charged with 'groggy' propensities. It was rather wet, both inside and outside the Head office yesterday.

TAX THE DOGS.

Our readers will perceive, on reading the following communication, that the dogs in Cañuelas have become a regular nuisance, killing both sheep and lambs wholesale every night.

Possibly our astute provincial Finance Minister will condescend to notice this complaint. Mr. Cazon, with his moan, succeeded in making the city dogs yield a handsome revenue. Now, although Minis or Dominguez is not hard up, he might find it a lucrative business for the State, and a great accommodation to the sheep-farmers, to inflict a capitation tax on rural canines.

To our own knowledge the statement of our correspondent is not in the least exaggerated. The dogs in some partidos have become such a nuisance that travelling on foot is almost impossible, and on horseback exceedingly dangerous. The Gauchos regard travelling on foot as a sort of European innovation which merits their chastisement. A poor traveller who has neither the will to steal, nor the money to buy a horse, is frequently sent upon the public road by these useless, good-for-nothing, noisy, snarling dogs. If he escapes with a slight laceration and his clothes torn, he may regard himself lucky in the extreme. We therefore think it our duty to call the attention of the Government to this dog nuisance. If not put a stop to, the camps will become like those of Entre Rios, where in some parts neither sheep nor cattle can be kept, on account of these terrible wild dogs:

Cañuelas, 9th June. Business is very dull, and money scarce. Lambs dying, no milk from the ewe. The greatest complaint we have at present is dogs killing sheep, and as yet no steps taken to prevent it. We have had upwards of 30 sheep

allied from time to time, and if you ask the owners to kill their dogs—the dogs which are at night hunted to their respective homes—they deny it. I should recommend a tax in a country where there are so many sheep, on every dog more than two, should be enforced, as many here who only own one flock have four at least. Your attention in publishing this may do good.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Tribuna's statement respecting the New York banking law is so grossly erroneous that we feel bound to correct our big colleague. We are glad, however, to see that the objections offered are no longer of a personal character. Such paltry grounds of opposition to so important a measure should not be resorted to. The only sound reason for opposing the law is the fictitious value which the Minister tries to put upon national securities. It is a matter, however, of perfect indifference whether the law be passed or not, as no capitalist will be found to invest his money in such dangerous concerns.

The news brought by the Pavon is of a most satisfactory nature, although we regret to hear of Colonel Sandes being wounded. Still it is consoling that we are making headway against the rebels.

If ounces were only as plentiful as oranges, we might laugh at the blackboard on the Boiss. The importation of oranges is beyond credence; nearly half a million were landed in the Boca on Monday. We hope our lady readers will avail themselves of the chance, and lay in a good stock of marmalade.

The wet weather on Tuesday put a complete stop to all business; even the Congressmen were kept prisoners in their houses. In front of the Boiss the torrent was frightful; the water ascended over the side-walks, and all crossing the street, was prevented.

THE FLORES CAMPAIGN.

The port of Montevideo has been closed to all vessels going up the Uruguay. By decree, June 7th. General Antonio Diaz is made commander in the capital. Lucas Moreno with a force of cavalry, infantry and artillery is appointed to defend the lines of Santa Lucia. The Chief of Police, Botana, has issued a proclamation to the traitor Flores in San José, since the 5th inst (16 leagues from town), and requiring their assistance in case he escape the pursuing forces and come towards Montevideo. Two youths named Viana and Santurio, have volunteered under Lucas Moreno.

Servando Gomez had a fire-thrower conflict with Flores' vanguard near the Guaycurú. Colonel Oñiz, after his defeat, succeeded in joining the main body. General Medina re-crossed the Rio Negro on the 4th inst towards Montevideo, as Flores had eluded him and was moving on San José. An immediate pitched battle is expected. Despatches from San José, 6th inst, announce that troops bearing the red insignia had encamped at Flores the estancia Larroira, near Guaycurú; the garrison at San José is 150 men. The Mercedes' battalion, state that they did very great execution after Oñiz's defeat, killing Fausto Aguilar and several other officers (?). Servando Gomez with 1000 men left Mercedes on the 5th. Medina's whereabouts is doubtful. Oñiz's division fled without firing a shot! There were none killed, but a few missing. Flores had stopped the diligences of Maciel and Bernardino with small detachments joined Medina; who is represented (Reforma) to have been on the 5th about 20 leagues from San José; or 6' from Gen Gomez's headquarters.

From Salto we learn that Flores narrowly escaped drowning in the Queguay; his force is represented, by two desertors, at 800 men; mostly Brazilians and Correntinos. The case against Belaustegui continues: it is said Caraballo was by a ruse to seize the Salto at Fray Bontos and pretend

to take the arms by force: Flores boasted that he expected arms at Rincon de las Gallinas to be brought from Buenos Ayres. We read that a prisoner was taken with despatches for Flores, from a Senator of Corrientes; also informing him that J. C. Ledesma left Entre Rios to join him with 80 men.

Borjes entered Dolores, where there was no garrison, but did no damage. Flores is said to have several wounded; but his horses are the best, and enable him to make rapid movements. The filibusters have murdered Mr Henry Smith, partner of Mr-Ramsbotham: having taken all his horses, they invited him to a neighbouring estancia where they would give him others, and sent a volley through him, on the way. He was aged 35 years. Some think that Flores is not to blame, as it occurred at Durazno, very distant from his march.

SCREW-STEAMBOATS.

Buenos Ayres, 9th June '63. The Captain of the steamer 'Esmeralda,' presents his compliments to Messrs. Mullall, and would be glad to know, why Screwboats are 'dangerous commodities' in the River Uruguay as opposed to Paddle steamers. To Messrs. Mullall Editors of the 'Standard.'

In answer to the above letter, we have to say, that our informant respecting the adaptability of Screwboats to the River Uruguay, is by no means an insignificant authority in such matters, and however erroneous his judgments may be in the matter, we can assure the Captain that he is one of the well wishers of the 'Esmeralda.'

THE LATE SIR G. C. LEWIS ON REVOLUTIONS.

The late Secretary for War, in his recent work 'On the Best Form of Government,' says there are some rare cases in which a nation has profited by a revolution. Such was the English revolution of 1688, in which the form of the Government underwent no alteration, and the person of the King was alone changed. It was the very minimum of a revolution; it was remarkable for the absence of those accompaniments which make a revolution perilous, and which subsequently draw upon it a vindictive reactionary movement. The late Italian revolution has likewise been successful; by it the Italian people have gained a better Government and have improved their political condition. It was brought about by foreign revolution, but its success has been mainly owing to the moderation of the leaders, in whom the people had the wisdom to confide, and who have steadily refrained from all revolutionary excesses. The history of forcible attempts to improve Governments is not, however, cheering: Looking back upon the course of revolutionary movements, and upon the character of their consequences, the practical conclusion which I draw is, that it is the part of wisdom and prudence to acquiesce in any form of Government which is tolerably well administered and affords tolerable security to person and property. If would not, indeed, yield to apathetic despair, or acquiesce in the persuasion that a merely tolerable Government is incapable of improvement. I would form an individual model suited to the character, disposition wants, and circumstances of the country, and I would make all exertions, whether by action or by writing, within the limits of the existing law, for ameliorating its existing condition, and bringing it nearer to the model selected for imitation; but I should consider the problem of the best form of government as purely ideal and as unconnected with practice, and should abstain from taking a ticket in the lottery of revolution, unless there was a well-founded expectation that it would come out a prize.

SHEEP-WASH—The South-Down Sheep wash seems out of fashion, or is expounded. Herr Carl Geyer succeeded Mr Bowers in the science of curing soap: some Irish farmers have taken the new Preparation on trial, and we are threatened with a list of testimonials from estancieros, which Herr Geyer expects will make him 'the man of the day.' The ovi-panacea is sold at 8 dols. mc per lb. or 20 p-8 cheaper than the South-Down extract of tobacco.

On Change.

June 10 At 12 past 11 o'clock ounces opened at 449 with a most decided upward tendency, in less than half an hour they ran up a dollar, at 12 past 12 O'U they were selling at 449 1/2; At one buyers were freely paying 450 at 12

past one two sales of 130 each, were made at 451 at 2 they closed at 450; firm being 5 1/2 within the last 8 days cash sales \$280.

The sales on time were extremely limited owing to the lamentably disturbed state of affairs. The Flores news was regarded as the omen of bad luck and many parties asserted that there was an understanding between him, Medina and Berro. Some parties opine that if he gets into Montevideo, it will cause a decline in specie, but we have no faith in such predictions: ounces are scarce, paper money is scarce, and public confidence, is gone. The Flores precedent is a bad one, no matter how right his cause may be. Sellers on time could not be found at any reasonable figures. Buyers were abundant.

In Exchange on England we only heard of one transaction of importance at 65 cash.

PRODUCE SALES.

1500 horse hides salt from a Saladero in the Uruguay at 13 1/2 rls on board in Barracas guaranteeing 34 lbs. 1400 arrobes good mestizo at 80 250 do lambs at 65 600 Cordova hides at 26 rls. 2500 arrobes wool at 83 1000 do do at 77 1000 hides. at 108

Owing to the weather nothing was done in the plaza, there are very few carts with produce in, and things are remarkable dull with the barragueros. The Pavon arrived this morning bringing \$19,650 mpc 51 oz and 1669 Bolivianos also 78 marks of silver.

The Salto arrived from Montevideo this morning but brought no specie and scarcely any cargo, we learn of the following sales of coal.

1683 tons per Union to arrive 11 pats 1516 tons per R. H. Tucker, 9 pats on 4 month time. Business is very dull in Montevideo, and very few sales can be effected. Several of the staple imports such as sugar and lumber, are unsaleable at present quotations, and have to be sent on here.

It is rumored that some ounces will be shipped per "Sainongo" to Rio, owing to the present state of exchange. It is also said that a certain party expects a large amount of foreign gold per Mercedes, but we only give the report as we heard it.

The Casa de Moneda emission stands as follows:

Emissions in '59 and 61, 160 millions

Burnt to date, 50 millions 640,000 mpc

Remaining yet to be destroyed, 109 millions 360,000 mpc

The actual cash on hand in the Casa de Moneda is alarmingly small—not quite 35 millions and a half in paper and not half a million in specie; while the deposits at interest alone amount to nearly 309 millions in currency and over one million and a half patacons in specie. Any sudden call on the Bank by the depositors would shake the old institution to its very foundation. Notwithstanding all its fiscal privileges, etc., it is perfectly impossible to suppose that the Bank could call in its discounts, mortgages, etc., in sufficient time to meet any possible run which might occur.

We feel it our duty to give the flattest contradiction to the statements contained in this morning's Tribune, regarding the Free Bank question: It is untrue that the State Comptroller in New York has or uses any supervision over the manufacture of Bank note paper. It is equally false that the hypothecated securities of the Bank of New York are confined to New York State securities; on the contrary, a vast of the Banks employ U. S. bonds as the least subject to fluctuation.
