The River Plate Magazine, first number, is at last out, and we are happy to say is well received.

The magazine contains 64 pages, is well printed and very nicely got up. The first chapter is a biographical sketch of our Admiral Brown, and is really interesting, containing many anecdotes respecting the great Argentine Admiral which were hitherto unknown.

The next chapter is a translation from Dominguez's history of the Argentine Confederation. As we are all acquainted with this work in the text, we have nothing particular to remark, save that its translation into English we regard as extremely useful.

The third chapter, "A Commercial Report of the Trade of the Argentine Republic, to the end of 1862," by our esteemed and talented Consul Hutchinson, of Rosario, abounds in valuable statistical information.

"A Tale of Carnival," from the same pen, discloses the danger of courtship in a masked ball. It is a lively, interesting chapter.

"Edgar Poe!" Who does not know his 'Raven'! Alas! poor Poe! One of the brightest and most gifted of American poets: driven to desperation by domestic affliction, he became a confirmed drunkard.

"Quoth the 'Raven' never more." Such, readers, is the first magazine ever published in the Plate. Mr. Williams, to use his own words, has, indeed, at last launched his fragile little barque upon the wide ocean of literature.

The hour for morning calls begins at 6 o'clock, and early on Friday I presented several letters of introduction. Don Carlos Saquier promised to present me to the President, but his excellency has been unwell, and sent me word that he would be happy to see me after 5 o'clock (21st). From 11 till 5 all the houses are closed, and nothing is done.

THE 'STANDARD' ABROAD.

First Impressions of Asuncion. Hotel de France, Asuncion, Dec. 29th, 1863.

It was about noon when I landed in Asuncion. The heat was awful, yet several women were washing linen on the beach, without any protection from the sun.

Trudging through a sandy soil, I set out for the Club and found the street deserted, it being the hour for siesta. I had walked about a mile, carrying my carpet-bag, under a scorching sun, for the side-path afforded no shade, when I met a man who took me for the Bolivian minister, and insisted on conducting me to his house.

After a refreshing sleep, I rose at 4 p.m., and went to visit the arsenal, distant about half a league. It is difficult to say whether this useful institution reflects more credit on the progressive Government of Paraguay or on the scientific chief, Mr. Whythead, and his able assistants.

I met a troop of soldiers carrying timber and other materials for building, one of whom directed my steps through the labyrinth of factories, forges, and new edifices which surround the principal workshop.

It is said that the Government is arming the 'Villa del Salto,' in Salto, in order to send her down to Paysandu, where, it is thought, Flores is concentrating all his strength.

All kinds of wood and iron work are here accomplished: a portable engine turns a number of bands, each working some intricate piece of machinery.

There are three large furnaces, and a steam-hammer, and the noise reminds one of home, for Buenos Ayres cannot boast such a school of industry.

The floating dock is progressing, and when finished will be a great additional advantage. There are over 150 hands employed in the arsenal, of whom the majority are natives, about 30 being Englishmen, and a few French, Italians, and Germans.

On Thursday I rode out with Dr. Skinner to Mr. Whythead's charming country house, situated on an eminence above the city. The view is one of the most delightful that can be imagined.

The ladies enquired particularly after M. Lefebvre de Becour and other diplomats, all of whom I assured them were in excellent health.

Don Candido Barvero conducted me on Saturday to visit the Minister of P. Affairs, Sr. Berjes, who entered warmly into my views on cotton-planting and promised me an attendant who would show me some plantations.

This morning I went by first train to Itaugui, in company with Mr. Valpy. If I have time before the mail goes I will give a description of this charming trip and of the cotton fields I saw there.

WONDERFUL ESCAPE.

Heroic Conduct of a Pilot. Awful Storm.

We noticed the other day a rather painful rumour which was circulated respecting a fire on board the Paraguayan steamer: yesterday one of the passengers on board called to see us about the matter, and furnished us with the following particulars.

The fire was out—yes; what was the matter with the hero of the occasion; had he been burnt, or had the shock been so great that reason forsook her throne? Thank Heavens no, and yet the poor fellow roared for help.

From Corrientes we hear rather strange news. One Colonel Reguero, who is a very influential chief, is at present in open resistance to the authorities, and all the minor officers are obedient to Reguero.

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Runaway matches are very scarce in Buenos Ayres; if, however, we are to believe report, one occurred on Sunday night in Calle Victoria.

Hector Varela is expected out in the next packet. He proposes to finish his book in Buenos Ayres; it is rumored that M. Varela then retires, but Casafouss and Cordova still remain in the same places.

We call attention to the advertisement in another column of the River Plate Steamship Company. It will be seen that the line contains five first class steamers.

The wool brokers in the Plaza have at last definitely settled the lienzo question, which has caused so many disputes this year.

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THE CHEAP BEEF QUESTION.

To the Editors of the Standard. Gentlemen,

You will greatly oblige one who has for years laboured for the advancement of this country by inserting the following account of a "beef meeting" recently held in Edinburgh.

On Friday night a working men's supper was held in the Calton Convention Rooms for the purpose of giving the workmen of Edinburgh an opportunity of judging of the merits of beef from Montevideo.

The Chairman, in opening the toast list, explained that he had taken this chair in the unavoidable absence of the chief magistrate, who found it impossible to attend.

The animals when slaughtered are immediately skinned, the flesh, with a sharp knife, is with extreme dexterity of manipulation stripped off his back and legs in long thin pieces; it is then put in an immersion of brine, slightly salted, in layers, and finally dried in the sun.

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object in view, I am very glad to have this opportunity of making one or two brief remarks on this beef, which you have now tasted, and, I hope, approved of (cheers). The great merit of this beef is its cheapness; and as it is somewhat of an anomaly that the merchants of Montevideo can sell wholesome and palatable butcher meat, free of waste and bone, at a price that it can with a fair profit be retailed 3d. or 3 1/2d. per lb., while the Edinburgh butchers charge 8d. or 9d. for beef including bone, sinew, &c., I will try in a few words to explain it.

The River Plate countries are noted for their splendid pastures, their rich grasses, and the consequent rapidity with which cattle multiply and increase, and while these natural causes have caused an immense increase in stock of cattle, there has been no corresponding increase of commerce for their flesh.

I have watched anxiously your efforts to introduce cotton-growing, and hope you will not say something in favour of Montevideo's dried beef. Mr. Gilmour informs me that your paper is greatly looked after in Scotland and England. A few words in your packet number would therefore serve the cause.

LATEST FROM ENTRE RIOS.

Urquiza has returned to San José. The soldiers are all discharged. Peron it appears after having a conference with Urquiza, who received him well, started off in his own boat alone for Paraná, to present himself to the Criminal Judge.

Everything is quiet in Entre Rios. It is rumored that Urquiza got up the whole affair, to show his power and prove his utility in Entre Rios.

It is said that Urquiza will be re-elected, although contrary to the Constitution; and that then he will call the Camaras together, and have his election ratified.

Pheidon Lopez is said to be in Corrientes. Telmo Lopez has passed over to Salto, Banda Oriental, in order to fight Flores at Paysandu, where it is expected there will be a grand attack.

Waldino is along with Lopez, Lamela is also at Paysandu, and Nadal has moored his boat to the Paysanduan wharf. The Indians under Cristo, are also at Paysandu. The Oriental Govt has about 1,000 men in the town to defend it; we hope that at last we shall hear of something decisive.

The Argentine Central Railway.

TO THE EDITORS OF THE 'STANDARD,' Gentlemen,

On perusing the columns of your valuable sheet, my eyes by chance fell upon the concluding paragraph of your article, headed 'The Argentine Central Railway,' in which you have been pleased to state that you "feel convinced that the 'crudos' are the worst enemies of Mr. Wheelwright and the Argentine Central Railway Company."

Without entering into the appreciation of the motives which guide the two factions that now distract this city and province, I must emphatically deny your assertion, and in this I am supported by yourselves, for in another part of the article in question, there you state that "we run over the list of names belonging to the opposition club, and we feel confident that there are 'none' who would wish to see the country plunged into civil war."

This, gentlemen, is the real fact, and nothing but the truth, for amongst the 'crudos,' as they are called, are to be found subscribers to a heavy amount in the Central Railway, and who have been ever foremost in patronising every project that have been presented to the Chamber,

and have always been looked upon as visionaries, by many of the men of 'buen sentido,' and who are the nucleus of the 'cocado' party; in fact, one of the chief of the 'crudo' party has been the most persevering promoter of the project in this country.

And now that I have got this far, may I be permitted (as you have doubted that there is such a character as an intelligent 'crudo'), in answer to an invitation contained in one of your late issues, "what injury the federalisation of this city has done the province or city of Buenos Ayres," to answer—"None." On the contrary, it has been a benefit. But this is not the question.

If you had taken the trouble to read the programmes of the 'Libertad' and 'Pueblo' Clubs, you will find that both parties sustain the same ideas, and these are, the maintenance of our present political situation. Of course, both parties mutually accuse one another of having an 'emere penes' in the matter; but we have no right to interpret people's intentions.

The province of Buenos Ayres, it is well-known, is the richest and most populated of the Republic, and still it is not so represented in the Chamber. Buenos Ayres is the only province that can counter-balance the President's power. Now, if you erase from the Argentine map this province, and make it nothing less than a military district, subject to the control of the Government, what will become of the liberties of the citizens, the day that unfortunately a tyrant President should wish to dominate?

The 'crudos,' with few exceptions, desire the residence of the National Government in this city, but, at the same time, they will not allow the whole province to be federalised, which is the 'cocado.' This is the difference on paper; but the truth is, that both parties desire power, and nothing but this will satisfy them.

As to the relative respectability of the parties, it's all humbug; they are six of one to half-a-dozen of the other, and this is well known. Our present worthy President, General Mitre, was raised to the proud position he now holds through the efforts of those who are now termed disturbers of the public peace, assassins, &c., whilst the "Latter day Saints" or Federalists, the revolvers of the 8th of November, the supporters of Doctor Derqui, and a few deluded young men, anxious to gain popularity at any price.

This, gentlemen, are the facts of the matter. All the writing and shouting is nothing but 'bosh,' designed to misguide the public.

When the lists of candidates are published, you will find the truth of what I have stated; and if the Crudos triumph in the elections, you will then see that they are the true friends of the advancement of the country, and especially of the Argentine Central Railway, one of the great projects for maintaining peace in this distracted nation.
