PROTRACTED QUESTION.

It frequently happens that a trifling matter of politics suffices to embroil a whole kingdom or even several States. Witness the Sleswig-Holstein difficulty which threatens to set Europe in a blaze.

The capital question in Buenos Ayres is somewhat similar, and the real matter at issue is lost sight of, in the smoke and bustle made by the combatants.

There is an advantage in these protracted questions: that they seldom terminate in a configuration, and though the political atmosphere be surcharged, the sheet-lightning is harmless and the storm resolves itself into a genial shower.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Buenos Ayres is at last out of mourning for the King of Denmark, and people seem to have regained their wonted cheerfulness.

The weather seems at last about to break. Yesterday, in the morning, there was a great appearance of a storm, which every one in the country is anxiously praying for.

Questions long protracted, like a low constantly bent, or an uncorked bottle of smelling-salts, lose their force, and evaporate. There is, therefore, much cause to trust that Sleswig-Holstein will not be amputated, before some question springs up with the pirates of Barbary or republic of San Marino.

CAMP POLITICS.

Nothing can more thoroughly prove the root which politics have in this country, than the fact that, notwithstanding the present lamentable state of the camp, and the utter ruin and misfortune which stares even the largest estancieros in the face, politics are the order of the day.

A farmer called on us yesterday to say that in Matanzas and Moreno, the

oblivion. The drama is generally speaking the well of the toll, who upon the Macabret principle is fulfilled by the odd sixpence, whilst the *Estancia* man who lives on his income, and has material interests at stake both in the rain and President Mitre.

If we pursue our observations a little further we shall find that the crudo in the country districts is generally speaking the man who has least to lose in case of a row, whilst the *coicido* has but the prospect of beggary if a revolution occurs.

It is said, we know not with what truth, that notwithstanding all the efforts of Messrs Acosta and Dominguez, that many of the country justices of the peace are more in favour of the National than the Provincial Governments, and that in the partidos where the judges are the very rawest crudos, the voters, nine out of ten, are in favour of the National Government.

If such is the case it remains only for the Club del Pueblo to send down to each of the partidos a confidential agent who will form a club, and drive the *Gauchos* in, to vote.

As an instance of this we may state that in the partido of San Vicente a certain party went down there the other day, and although the judge is an out and out crudo, the whole people of the town and the partido flocked to his banner and assured him of their support.

Furthermore, it is essential that it be thoroughly explained to the people in the country, that the Club del Pueblo labours solely for peace and the continuance of the present order of things, as we have been informed that a few crudos have been laboring indefatigably to persuade the people that the *coicidos* are trying to get up a revolution, and make every man a soldier.

To counteract these erroneous ideas, it is the duty of the Club del Pueblo to publish, clearly and distinctly, not only its programme, but also the object which the enemies of the National Government are trying to effect.

As a general rule the people in the camp are all in favour of Mitre and his Government, and by the very smallest exertion on the part of the *coicidos*, such an overwhelming majority can be secured at the next elections that all opposition will be swept away, and the rule of order, law, and peace firmly established.

His son is still in a most critical position, and if the ball in the neck he not extracted, the doctor says the head must be amputated. *Aide-de-Camp* Larrios is also in a very dangerous way, owing to the extreme heat of the weather.

SCANDALOUS OUTRAGE.

We are indebted to the "Tribuna" for the following:

On the 14th inst. about 3 p.m., in the street of General Brown, a scandalous affair took place. Nino, the *Alcalde* of that district, in company of another person, both on horseback and intoxicated, passed along that street.

The *alcalde's* companion, perhaps on account of the state in which he was, was unable to manage his horse, and rode over a small child of two years of age. A neighbour, a Frenchman, who ran to its assistance, dragged the infant from beneath the horse's hoofs, exclaiming: "Is that the way to ride through the streets, causing damage to the people?"

This not being to the taste of the *alcalde*, he asked Dr. Derozeux "Who are you," who answered, "It is not at all necessary to say."

Nino, insulting the Doctor, seized the reins of his horse, and dealt him so severe a blow that Derozeux fell down.

The *alcalde* dismounted, and showing him, ordered him to go along as prisoner. "Leave me alone," said the Dr., "and I'll go."

Nino, excited with drink, commenced beating him with his rebenque. The Doctor, in self defence, seized hold of the *alcalde*, and threw him on the ground; both fell, one on top of the other. Three vigilantes, on foot, now made their appearance, with their sabres drawn.

"Pitch into that blackguard of a Frenchman," shrieked Nino, "even although you kill him."

The vigilantes, being in the same state of clearheadedness as their superior, did not wait for second orders, but commenced cutting right and left. Nino also took his part in the small game of giving sabre cuts.

Naturally enough this scandalous row attracted the attention of the neighbours, who called out to Nino to spare the Doctor; and one lady, unable to witness such a scene, addressed herself to the *alcalde*, requesting him not to allow an old man, who was already down, to be so badly treated. The only answer to this appeal was a most gallant attack upon the lady, who luckily escaped into the house of Don Francisco Linetty.

The lady was severely wounded on the head with the butt end of the rebenque, and is now confined to bed.

The *Comisario* Leguizamón now appeared upon the scene, and ordered the two prisoners to proceed under charge of the *alcalde*.

On the way, the *Comisario* told Derozeux that his gold lace did not matter one straw, and on the Doctor replying, he received more blows.

On arriving at the *Comisaria* the prisoners were placed in the stocks, the *alcalde* and the vigilantes still continuing their riotous conduct.

It is patent in the *Boca* that the *Comisario* received notice from the *Policia* that the process formed against him for the disturbances on the day of the elections would be quashed, and that on account of this pardon, the *alcalde* and vigilantes were going about with sword and pistol in hand, shouting "Down with the Gringos!"

Dr. Derozeux has suffered severely, not only from the blows he received, but also from his six hours confinement in the stocks.

TARPEIAN ROCK.

The alleged reason for abusing the Minister, is his incompetence in the finance department. But it is right to remark that the "Tribuna" people seem only to have discovered the shortcomings of Dr. Elizalde, since the "crudo" and "coicido" question originated. Whatever objections we may have entertained against Dr. Elizalde, respecting the Flores' question, we must bear testimony to his active exertions on behalf of the National Government.

He accepted the charge of the Hacienda Department, influenced by the patriotic motive of assisting President Mitre, when Dr. Veloz Sarafiel prematurely resigned. And if the national treasury is so low in funds as is represented, possibly the "Tribuna" is more to blame than the *Legacion* *Comisario* Minister, as half the disturbances and revolutions in the country are said to be caused by the "Tribuna." We like fair play. Let the "Tribuna" attack Minister Elizalde, because he is a "coicido." This is the real cause of complaint, and nothing else.

ROSARIO MAILS.

The *Ferrocarril* of Tuesday, had nothing important. A masked ball took place at the theatre on Sunday night. Colonel Lozica arrived en route for Corrientes to resume the command of his battalion. Mr. Orandlo of the Cordoba railway works returned from his visit to B. Ayres. The 1st batt. is reported by the Health Committee to be free from fever, though infected with another infirmity.

Datos from Catamarca are to January 9th. Sor Maubecin, brother to the Governor, died; the official organ says he was greatly regretted, but mentions nothing of the summary executions, imprisonments &c. for which this delightful locality and its Governor have become so justly celebrated. Accounts from several provinces of the interior are very harassing, and the death of the Chacho has not put an end to the disorders. Jujuy, Salta, Tucuman and Santiago are quiet. An herb which effectually cures goitrous swellings in the throat has been discovered in Jujuy, and immense quantities have been exported to Mendoza, Salta and Catamarca.

Cordoba is said to be on the verge of a revolution, the opposite factions being greatly inflamed. Gov. Ferreira's term of office expires in February, when the President of the Chamber will rule for three days: the elections will then come off. It is said Dr. Costa strongly exhorted the rival legislators to peaceful conduct. The harvest has commenced, but all other business is quite paralysed, as every body expects an interregnum of anarchy at the approaching crisis. The Minister Santana declares that shooting and violation of domicile are not contrary to the Constitution, in certain cases.

THE DROUGHT.

We have seen a meteorological table, drawn up by Sr. Eguia, pointing out the quantity of rain which has fallen in Buenos Ayres during 1861, 1862, and 1863, according to a rain gauge, elevated 7 varas from the ground, in an isolated position.

It is a work of great care and minuteness, and will be very useful under present circumstances, as the "seca" is the topic of the day.

In 1861 least rain fell, as is shown in the small number of 24.15 inches. In 1862 fell 43.59 in inches; and in 1863 29.53 inches. But what has increased the effect of the drought this year is, that in the hottest months, when most rain is required, the diminution of last year was considerable—as witness—

In September, October, November, and December the quantity was—  
In 1861 349.5 in. inches.  
1862 410.8 do  
1863 170.3 do

Herein lies the cause of the drought. The country owes many thanks to Sr. Eguia for his scientific researches.

LOCAL EVENTS.

Cheap Sheep.—A native *estanciero* who has already lost 40,000, offers the remaining 30,000 at 90 mpc each, or to anyone who will guarantee him 10,000 after the drought.

The Dusty Family.—These celebrated acrobats have at last arrived—and give a performance to-night in the Colon Theatre. They are, according to the judgment of those who have seen them, superior to the Leccas bros. One of their most surprising feats is the Jump over Niagara. If they should fall into that river, the enthusiasm of the spectators might be somewhat damped.

General Massacre.—Since the commencement of the sanguinary struggle in the United States, from various causes, such as death on the field, from sickness and from starving, the Federals have lost 60 generals, whilst the loss in the Confederate side, from the same causes, has been 66 generals.

The Mercedes Outrage.—An account, very different from that we published on the 16th inst., appears in the "Tribuna" of yesterday. Diaz, the official of that partido, has come down to Buenos Ayres, on account of the bad feeling entertained towards him by the British in that district. Some of them, the British, are reported to have said that, rather than allow Diaz to escape, they would lose every sheep they possessed. It also appears that previous to this unfortunate affair, Diaz was a general favorite in the Villa.

**Bullock.**—We read that the clerk of a commercial house shot himself on last Monday, having first sent a policeman with a letter to his family. He appears to have been a native.

**Pharmaceutical society.**—We refer this body to the cure for gonorrhoea mentioned in to day's news from Rosario. It is a matter of high interest to the medical and botanical world.

**Railway Accident.**—When the first train on Tuesday morning was reaching the bridge of Maldonado, the attention of the passengers was called by the repeated whistling of the engine, when it was discovered that a man was walking along the rails, perfectly unconscious of his danger. The signal was repeated several times, but it was of no use. The man was thrown down, slightly bruised, and would most probably have been cut into a thousand pieces, had not the engine luckily had a 'cow-lifter' in front which threw him off the track. The man was lifted by the guard, and on examination was found to be slightly hurt. The poor unfortunate was a deaf and dumb man, employed in working on the line.

**Galloping.**—Three classes of men—sailors, sailors, and dragoon officers—are generally considered to be the worst riders in the world. No sooner do they get on the outside of a horse than they set off full speed. The first class is very common in Buenos Ayres, as Jack (of all nations) seems to think that the principal enjoyment on shore is getting on board a horse and keeping 'her head straight,' chalking off as many knots as possible, at the same time perfectly heedless as to whether he carries away his own spurs or those of his neighbours. But Jack is not the only one who indulges in galloping in the street: this mode of progression is getting too prevalent among all classes, to the great danger of foot passengers. We trust that the police will see their regulations against galloping enforced.

**Shipwreck.**—By a newspaper of Rio de Janeiro we see that a British barque named unknown, with a cargo of coal for one of the steamship companies, was wrecked on the Bar of Cananea.

**Indians.**—The Indians have made, on the 12th inst., another descent, at a place called 'royo Quequen Salato.' They did not succeed in stealing anything, as they had been discovered by the scouts and outposts of Colonel Machado's force. The surveyor, Lavalle, and another were taken prisoners, but they managed to escape, and are now with their forces; how they succeeded in effecting their escape is not known.

**Valuable Cargo.**—The expected tea cargo from Hong Kong to the deceased Mr. Latham has at last arrived, owing to the state of the market we believe the tea will sell at remunerative prices.

**El Pueblo.**—Our new evening colleague started with 1000 subscribers, and daily augments its number. Most of the foreign houses take it instead of the Nacional, and several lists are open through town for the purpose of transferring the subscribers of MM. Pinciro & Sarsfield's paper to the Pueblo.

**El Semanario.**—Our Paraguayan colleague is about to appear twice a week; perhaps, before long, Asuncion will boast a daily paper.

**Villa Mercedes.**—We saw a letter yesterday, which states that heavy losses have been sustained; some Irish farmers have lost two, three, and even four thousand sheep. In San Antonio also a general 'hegira' has been pronounced.

**Emigrants.**—Yesterday 90 emigrants arrived from Genoa per Kosita.

On board the Lorenzo Valerio has come some railway iron.

**DEATH.**

At the Rincon del Sauce, department of Colonia, in the Oriental Republic, on the 9th instant, killed by lightning, Mr. Peter Kerr, aged 24 years, a native of Greenock, Scotland. On the 11th his mortal remains were consigned to their last resting-place, in the cemetery of the Waldenses, the worthy pastor of the colony, in the most courteous and impressive manner, reading over the grave a Spanish version of the beautiful 'Burial Service' of the Church of England, in the presence of a few awe-struck and sorrowing friends.

Mr. Kerr's career in South America has been short, and its sudden termination deeply impressive. He arrived in this port in July last, and immediately proceeded to his destination in the neighbouring state. With the decision characteristic of his countrymen, he had gone through the preliminary training requisite for the enterprise in which he was about to embark, and only a few days were wanting for his making a fair and promising start in the great race of life. Such was the aspect of his affairs on the morning of the fatal 9th of January; but, as the Spanish proverb so expressively states—'Man propone, and God dispone.' About two, p.m., of that day he rose from the dinner-

table, in all the buoyancy of youth, health, and strength, to attend to his outdoor duties, and in less than three short hours he was stretched a lifeless mass, side by side with the horse on which he was mounted! A solemn warning to survivors: to him, let us hope, a kind and merciful dispensation, exempting him not only from the ordinary pain of death, but also from its fear.
