THE DROUGHT.

We have seen a meteorological table, drawn up by Sr. Egua, pointing out the quantity of rain which has fallen in Buenos Ayres during 1861, 1862, and 1863, according to a rain gauge, elevated 7 varas from the ground, in an isolated position.

In 1861 the rain fell, as shown in the small number of 24.15 inches. In 1862 fell 43.59 in inches; and in 1863 29.93 inches. But what has increased the effect of the drought this year is, that in the hottest months, when most rain is required, the diminution of last year was considerable—as witness:
