Unhappily, however, fear is contagious in the human breast, and the young ladies in the adjoining house hearing the uproar, imagined that the would-be burglars had jumped into the back patio of their house. Here was a dilemma; the ladies rose, dressed themselves, and notwithstanding the fearful entreaties of their mamma, refused to go to bed. Under the circumstances there was nothing for it, save to search the house. Then began the second search, which ended like the first; the consequence was that the whole 'barrio' was awake all night, as none of the female portion of the neighbourhood could sleep. It is to be hoped that M. Cassafuath will soon hurry home before another such occurrence takes place.

Through the exertions of Mr. Elías, co-editor with Mr. Williams, the 'River Plate Magazine' has gained an influx of 80 subscribers in Montevideo. This speaks well for the future of our colleague, and we wish it a like increase in Buenos Ayres.

#### Funeral of Archbishop Hughes

The New York papers state that as early as five o'clock in the morning of the day of the funeral, people began to assemble about St. Patrick's Cathedral. The ceremonial is described as having been most impressive. On a magnificent catafalque in the centre aisle lay the body of the archbishop, placed in an uncovered coffin of rosewood, lined with white satin, the head elevated upon cushions of purple silk. He was dressed in the archiepiscopal robes and insignia of office worn in life, the chasuble and the dalmatic being the undergarments. Over these the alb, the purple soutan, and cincture of rich velvet embroidered in gold. Around his neck was the pallium, from which was suspended the pectoral cross of gold. His feet were clad in purple stockings, with shoes of purple velvet and gloves upon his hands of the same colour. He wore upon his finger the same ring with which he was consecrated, 28 years exactly from the day upon which he was buried. On one side of the coffin was placed the crozier, and on the other the episcopal crosier. At the foot two crosses of evergreens and white japonicas. After the office for the dead, and grand Mass of requiem, a funeral discourse was preached by one of the bishops. At the conclusion of this discourse the ceremonies of last absolution were performed, all the bishops present taking part, each in turn intoning the office and passing round the body, sprinkling upon it holy water, and swinging over it the censers filled with burning incense. The remains were borne to the vault near the door by six priests of the diocese, preceded by the bishops, and followed by the family and relatives of the deceased, the priests chanting the Benedictus. The concluding prayers at the vault were read by Bishop Timon, and the body was again sprinkled with holy water and incensed, and lowered to its last resting-place. The Archbishop was buried on the 26th anniversary of his consecration as bishop. He died on the day of his patron saint, St. John, and had often expressed a wish to die on that day. The courts all adjourned for the day, out of respect to his memory, and the flags on the public buildings were displayed at half-mast. All the public offices were closed.
