THE PARTIDOS OF MORON AND ARRECIFES.

In 1863 the lands and properties of Moron were assessed by Government valuation under \$100,000 being (in round numbers) the same as the previous year. Last year they appear as 112, or one-tenth the total value of the campagna.

The heat seems on the increase, being at present much more intense than it has been at Rio Janeiro in the middle of the past Summer. Last year we lighted parlor fires by this time of the season. Yesterday, one could hardly breathe, the atmosphere was so sultry, and there were signs of a heavy rain-storm.

The late showers have done a slight service in some parts of the camp, but we hear from the Capilla-Señor that the land is as bare as our streets. The cattle in many places are dying from eating thistles.

An English gentleman just arrived from Pilar informs us that the Tribuna report about a Maz-horcada and great Orudo victory is false. The utmost order prevailed and the Crudos admit their majority was but one, 138 to 137.

There was great confusion on the Mole yesterday, the passengers for Paraguay and Uruguay being taken off in haste. The Paxon discharged her passengers in like manner. One boat having got around was taken in tow by a horse-cart.

THE ROSARIO MAILS.

The 'Ferro Carril,' 1st inst., brings no news of the provinces. Don Marcelino Freyre has been named Chief of Police of Rosario, in room of Sr. Alvarado, resigned.

The mutiny of Melincub is thus described by a correspondent:— At 2 o'clock in the morning of the 23rd of March, we were returning towards the fort, having given up all chase of the Indians; the regiment was in regular marching order, and we pushed on at a smart gallop.

Our safety lay in our firmness, for if we had fled at the first alarm, they would have pursued and butchered us singly. Those who wavered were overawed by the bold stand of the Colonel, who, as he was mounted on a fine horse, might have hoped to out-distance the mutineers, but rather held his ground in the midst of the infernal scene.

STAND AND DELIVER!

This city is at present a defenceless prey to one or more gangs of daring highwaymen, who have committed some 20 murders or robberies within the last ten days. The plague rages, like yellow fever, every day adding fresh victims.

The only method of stopping the evil is to erect five gibbets on the following roads: Palermo, Cinco Esquinas, Flores, Calle Arenas, and Lomas de Zamorra. By hanging two malefactors weekly either from the Carcel or Policia, we may strike terror into the murderous foot-pads.

A poor foreigner who was in the habit of trafficking in fowl and eggs, among the quintas beyond Huaco de los Sauces, was missed last week, and at length his corpse turned up near the roadside exhibiting terrible wounds; his pockets had been rifled of the few dollars he possessed.

The N. Argentino mentions an estancia being assassinated at Caballito, and states that the Southern outlets are unsafe in broad daylight. Also that an Englishman was robbed of everything and left naked, on the night of the 30th ult.

This gives a total of 35 murders and robberies last month, and if we are not fast driving to a Californian state of affairs, it is not the fault of the authorities. These infernal elections so occupy the Chief of Police and other authorities that 'Stand and Deliver' is now as common a salutation as 'lend me your cigar-light.'

This month's number has fairly surpassed our most sanguine expectations, and in excellence of writing, diversity of subject, and general get up would be no disgrace to similar undertakings in the old world.

RIVER PLATE MAGAZINE.

The first article, 'Inauguration of the Great Southern Railway' is a succinct but eloquent introduction to the reproduction of the 'Song of Steam.' The song is wondrous pleasing, and in its measure there is a kind of gentle breathing, as though a giant, whom to rule was dangerous, had just finished a hearty meal off some small tender children, and was at peace with all the world.

'Life in the River Plate' is a series of remarks on the brighter side of life in the Uruguay Republic, extracted from a most exaggerated pamphlet distributed in England by the Montevidean Government.

The 'Blackman,' is a continuation of an article which appeared last month from the pen of Professor Burmeister. To the friends of our black brethren, it must be very gratifying to read this article; but the learned Professor unwittingly strengthens the argument of his opponents. He admits the analogy of conformation between the ape and the negro—no might go further than the physical conformation, and say that, like the ape, the negro neither invents, commits suicide, nor laughs—three distinguishing traits of the human race.

Several new facts will be elucidated from this article; amongst others, that the word 'mulatto' is derived from the word 'mula.' Till now, we candidly confess that we were labouring under the delusion that it was derived from the coptic word 'molu' (bastard); but let the etymology of the word be what it may, the mulatta seems to make a most agreeable companion and helpmate.

The 'Taravi of the martyr-poet' is a short, apt, and pleasing description of the Peruvian 'coronach,' or lament, by one of Peru's brightest luminaries, Melgar. This is an article, particularly suited to the softer sex, and shows no small amount of acquaintance with the 'poets of the passion.'

'How to encourage Emigration.' The author, after praising the laudable efforts of the present Government, to advance the country by railways and other arts of peace, proposes, as a mode of encouraging emigration, that the consular agents abroad be empowered to give all publicity to the advantages offered to emigrants, &c. We would humbly suggest that the consular agents abroad also have published, in their offices, as an inducement to intended emigrants, a copy of all the monthly murders which go un punished.

It is a decided improvement having the 'index of contents' printed outside of the cover of the magazine, and we can safely predict, that if the magazine goes on as it does this month it will be a boon to the Anglo-Porto society. The editors should guard against the danger of prosing on heavy subjects, and give as many light articles on different subjects as he can. Nor would it be out of place for them to reproduce in his pages the 'In Memoriam,' and 'W. M. Thackeray,' which appeared in the January number of 'Cornhill.'

Many here are unable to get the original of these two articles, and it is only by means of a local publication that the rising Anglo-Porto generation will see what a loss the guild of literature has sustained.

CONFEDERATE CRUISERS.

Intelligence arrived on the 14th Feb. from the Cape of Good Hope that the Confederate cruiser, 'Tuscaloosa,' had been seized in Simon's Bay by her Majesty's ship Narcissus, under orders from the Governor, acting in accordance with instructions from the Home Government.

Since her last visit to the Cape, the 'Tuscaloosa' had been cruising between that place and Brazil. She had spoken above a hundred vessels, only one of which, however, proved to be a Federal viz., the 'Living Age'; but as she had an English cargo on board, she was released on a bond being given.

During her cruise, the 'Tuscaloosa' had put into a Brazilian port for water and supplies, but was refuted both, and in consequence the crew are said to have been placed on short allowance. Lieutenant Lowe the commander had lodged a formal protest against seizure with Admiral Sir Baldwin Walker, which will of course be transmitted to London. The United States Consul, Mr. Graham, had also advanced a claim to the vessel on behalf of her former owners, and had been informed that she would be detained until she could be handed over to them.

The 'Cape Argus' of Jan. 6 says—"The point upon which the authorities at home differ in opinion from Mr. Denysen, who was acting attorney-general, and as such, legal adviser of the Government, when the 'Tuscaloosa' formerly visited the Cape, is as to the competency of Captain Semmes to condemn prizes without taking them to a regularly-constituted prize-court. Such court Captain Semmes claims to constitute on board the 'Alabama' by virtue of authority from his Government, and the question at issue is, whether that court, or pretended court, is a court whose decisions aggrieved persons are bound to submit to, and other Governments to acknowledge and accept. In our view, the very idea of a court implies that the persons whose property is to be disposed of shall have the right of being present and the power of advocating their cause. With these conditions it cannot be said that the court held by Captain Semmes on board the 'Alabama' complies. And his court certainly is not such a court as the other Powers of the world have established. It may be said that the circumstances of the Confederate States are exceptional, and that the coast being blockaded by a superior naval power, it would be impossible for Captain Semmes to send his prizes for condemnation to a court of his own country. But that, we take it, is an accident of the unpleasant consequences of which the Confederates must submit to; and if Captain Semmes' court be not such a court as independent Powers are bound to acknowledge and respect, the condemnation was clearly illegal. Upon that point the whole case turns. If the condemnation was illegal, the conversion of the 'Conrad' into an armed cruiser and her commission as such was equally so, and she cannot claim indemnity from seizure as a man-of-war. If, on the other hand, it be held that the condemnation was sufficient, then is the 'Tuscaloosa' entitled to all the privileges of a ship of war, one of which is freedom from arrest."—Brazil and River Plate Mail.
