**GARIBOLDI'S VISIT TO ENGLAND.**

The following account of Garibaldi's arrival at Southampton is from the special correspondent of a contemporary, dated Sunday.

"The news has just arrived to the interest and satisfaction which his visit of Garibaldi has excited in this town. It may well be doubted whether there is another living man who could awaken so profound and universal a feeling of admiration and respect or so induce men to pay him homage. One need not be told many hours at Southampton before he that the town speaks with one voice on the subject. It is the utterance of no class or party. To the honor of the Conservatives they have cooperated with that most warmth and earnestness in the preparations for doing honor to the hero of Italy. There may, perhaps, be exceptions, but they are of too insignificant a character to be noticed, and can, therefore, scarcely be said to form a contrast to the noble spirit which animates the entire mass of the population. Their sentiments extend through the adjacent island. The newspaper of Naples, which elects a Tory mayor with the same unabating regularity that the earth makes its annual revolution, has, we believe, unanimously adopted an address to General Garibaldi. Such an address is worthy of note, as it comes from a source which has never availed itself on the part of large communities, of whatever elements they may be composed. Garibaldi is not regarded from a sectional point of view, or even as the representative of a national idea. He is regarded as the champion of the cause of the freedom of man, without distinction of colour or race, and a man who throughout his public career has exhibited the unshaken patriotism of a Washington, the military genius of Gustavus Adolphus, and the fiery spirit of the which the poor and oppressed have been the blamable king. In the port of Southampton an unceasing stream of visitors poured into the town from all parts of the country, and the prolonged signals were anxiously looked for during the entire day. Instead of the heavy and continuous rain which made the previous day intolerable to the people of Southampton, the sun shone brightly, and the sunniest Southerner could have desired. Only a scanty cloud here and there hid the deep blue of the sky, and the sunshine which sparkled on the beautiful scene of the Southampton Water seemed as if it had come to smile a welcome to Garibaldi. But even after the sun had set with the stars of the good ship, and while it was yet possible that he might arrive at any moment, the people generally settled with the impression that she would not reach her destination till the morrow. Still rumour was busy enough, and even Mr. Scully, the reporter by whom the "Daily Telegraph" is telegraphed to Liverpool, and that she might be expected to arrive at Southampton between four and five o'clock this morning. The rumour got wing and circulated with prodigious rapidity over the town, but we have cast it off as a mere dream of ours to the morning of the 21st, the sunniness of the day, and strong distinct sound when it was found that after all Garibaldi did not arrive, and that instead of the lively westerly of the previous day the sky was overcast with clouds and was patterning against the windows.

Now it was Sunday, and what was apprehended was that the steamer would not be able to get into the port of Southampton, and flags and fanfares are as much an institution in the town as the corporation itself. They are also well provided with canons on the battery platform, with which they can thunder with either welcome or defiance. But on Sunday evening the alarm was given. Invitations from the Governor, Sir William Colquhoun, to dine with him, and the ladies were compelled to forego altogether the state of fifteen gowns and the picturesqueness display which they had contemplated. At half-past twelve a telegram was received from Hurst Castle, informing that the steamer had arrived, and was to receive him with the utmost enthusiasm. On arriving at the Mayor's residence, on the summit of which was hoisted the Italian flag, with the cross of Savoy, the General was conducted to his private apartments, and repeatedly responded to the acclamations of the people by showing himself at the windows of his apartment.
