THE ORIENTAL THEATRE.

By the news which arrived on Sunday from Montevideo (which will be found in another column) it appears that people in Montevideo are hourly expecting the proclamation of peace, whilst in Buenos Ayres the Orientals who belong to the Colorado party are equally confident that no peace will be entered into on the bases proposed. Possibly, now since the Brazilian squadron has arrived, the revolutionists in Buenos Ayres will be less pretentious, but it is a matter of the deepest regret to every foreigner who takes any interest in the future of the Uruguay to see the efforts which are now made to defeat the negotiations.

Unless the real object for opposing peace is to bring about the most serious complications in the River Plate, we cannot understand the arguments adduced; but to our mind there is very little to be lost, to save the independence of a sister republic and rescue this republic from a rather questionable struggle.

Besides, it is right to remark that the Argentine Minister, whose sympathy is avowedly with the Colorado party, has in his interviews with the Minister, met with the most cordial treatment from Minister Aguirre's Government. All he asked on behalf of the party which Flores leads was freely conceded. If therefore Mr. Thornton and Sr. Elizalde are to be made fools of simply to please the Colorado men of this city, both they and Flores must take the consequences. Regarding the matter on its whole bearing, we think that it is extremely improbable that Flores would attempt to play such a role, more particularly as we learn, on undoubted authority, that his merry men are suffering the greatest hardships, owing to the severity of the weather, and are deserting fast. There is no firm belief, as anxious to make peace as his friends, who live in comfortable houses in this city, are for war.

A great dispute is now going on touching the immutability of principles and such like, that the terms of peace as proposed by M. Elizalde leave matters precisely in the same state as they were before Flores invaded and that consequently the revolution has after all gained nothing. We deny this, however, the Flores revolution has succeeded in bringing the country to a very verge of ruin; the Flores revolution has established one great fact, and that is that nowadays the people who create a civil war, they and their children, have to pay for it. If there is one patriotic Oriental in this city, one true republican who lives up to the immortal Washington as the prototype of republicanism excellence, what must be his feelings at seeing his country ruined, his fellow countrymen beggared, and all for what? Verily, the victims of Quintana suffered less than the survivors who have undertaken to avenge them. If the peace negotiations are broken off, if Mr. Flores thinks proper to snub Moore, Thornton, Elizalde and Lamus, if the revolution is to be continued, then we will roll up the map of the Banda Oriental and exclaim with the heroic Marlene Boland, "Oh Liberty! what crimes are committed in thy name."

EDITOR'S TABLE.

We hear that the prospects of the National Government are so good that some Argentine Capitalists are languid together in buying up all the bonds of the National Government. They pay at high as 45 per cent, and we have no doubt they will soon touch fifty. We caution our friends against selling the national bonds if we have peace they will next year be worth par. The 'Reforma Pacifica' publishes a most interesting article on the subject of wool growing all over the globe; we will try to reproduce it as it will interest our camp subscribers. A new emigration society is badly needed, as the present one is utterly inefficient. We hope the Governor will

take the matter up. We want a good agricultural company started, with a capital of a million at least. If the Government would only guarantee such a company seven per cent, interest on the capital the company would be easily formed. London, June 20th. We got a peep into the share-book of the Central Railway the other day; never was there a more damning proof of the want of public spirit amongst our countrymen than this book. The few remaining shares on hand we hope to see taken by one spirited Argentine to return the character of the country in such a manner. Should any gentleman be started in this country the commission will have his eyes opened to what sympathy he may expect from the selfish Argentine capitalists.

There is a new English washing establishment started in Barracas, (see advertisement). We hope all the English ladies in town will support it, as the terms are remarkably reasonable. All the English dressmakers in town are at present working to death making dresses, etc., for the weddings which will shortly come off. It is a pity that our 'Les-Bain-Talk' was received with less favor than our 'Lidder's Table,' as there is a deal of little social chit chat going on.

On last Sunday there was a grand ceremony, the christening of a Turk, who about to be married, on a very rich Portuguese. The Turks are peculiarly successful in capturing wealthy Portuguese. Martin Garcia is represented, by one of our colleagues, to be in a most dilapidated condition. We consider that as there has been no war or engagement of any description, since the place has been fortified, this is a rather premature discovery. We should like that some of our colleagues paid a visit to the 'London battery' at Humayta, they would there see Italian fortifications. When we consider the money that has been spent on Montevideo, we feel inclined to say that the Minister of War should be brought up before the House and interrogated on the subject.

Several very interesting lawsuits are at present going on in the courts. One which has been decided the other day, is for stealing sheep, against two fellows, named Cruz Latorre, and Manuel Bero. This case is of great interest, as it has been decided in the merits of the Peruvian. Pinerio lovinz appears purchased the stolen sheep from Don Cruz. The sentence passed was that the sheep should be returned, and approved on appeal by the court.

Another important lawsuit, which has come up on appeal from the Chamber of Commerce, is that of M. Fortunato Perez, for a wage lost at the races in that town. Don Luis Chavez, who is the plaintiff, asserts that the defendant has not been paid as decided in favour of the respondent. The British mail steamer Mercy leaves on next Sunday. Mail close at the Consul's office on Saturday evening at five o'clock. Strange that the agent of the English Postmaster-General has advertised his Post-office notice in all the native papers, and forgotten to give publicity in the 'Standard.' In consequence of an unpleasant question arising the other day, with a subscriber about an advertisement for one of his stanzas, we feel it necessary to advise our readers that all advertisements not being permanent, must be paid for in cash.

The little Argentine steamer, bearing the euphonious name of Felix Colon, has been getting her boilers made larger, and, we believe, will run again to-morrow. She will call at Martin Garcia.

We hear that the popular and commodious stables, in front of President Mitre's house, are about to be shut up, as the owner of the property is about to build a stately mansion on the long hill. As a proof of the sudden rise in value of property in that locality, we may state that the yard was offered for sale for 2,500,000 dollars some five years ago, and now the owner refuses to sell it for a million.

The most unpleasant rumours are circulating through town, respecting the failure and suicide of the unfortunate Cavalieri. We have no doubt, however, that these versions are utterly destitute of foundation, and are directed by a few indignant creditors.

Every vessel that comes from Paraguay, now brings us tobacco. Berry and Walker's express wagon cleared out again last Saturday, and dashed right into Mr. White's yard. Unfortunately the wheel came off. Why the horse took fright cannot be discovered, unless it was from the intoxicating odor of some of that real old Irish whiskey which they sell, and which they were loading in the wagon at the time of the accident.

The splendid mansion in Barracas belonging to a French merchant of this city, we hear is shortly to be sold by auction. We will have had money enough to buy it. We can say that we admire the peculiar style of architecture, but the house is most commodious and finished with the greatest elegance.

ROBBERIES.

Mr. Bockmann has left the house of Duguid and Co., and the power of attorney granted him by that firm has been cancelled.

Mr. Moreno Turz states in an advertisement that he used some ungentlemanlike expressions, in a moment of anger, against Mr. Juricene, which he publicly retracts.

Dr. Antonio Areosa, who, it appears, has fallen, goes in a polite way to work; he calls on all his creditors to send in their accounts to be liquidated. This is a general way of winding up, and we hope to see it adopted here.

An animated discussion took place in one of the most fashionable streets, as to whether the new Consul who succeeded Mr. Huphaway are subscribers to the 'Standard'; high words ensued between the parties. We have looked over our Rosario list, but find they are not. Possibly these consular gentlemen don't understand English.

The Captain of the Post is still in the greatest perplexity as to the two claims which he holds. Will nobody claim them?

A general order has been fixed for the arrest of all the small boys in the town, as they are found to be a great nuisance.

The offers sent in for building a bridge over the Salsidillo have not been accepted, and new bids are called for, to be sent in before the 31st June. When that day will occur we are at a loss to say; but we suppose some work in the Government House purports so essential the notice to prove the necessity of even having such a bridge constructed.

On the 30th inst., at twelve o'clock, 200 marcs are to be knocked down (provided they don't kick) at public auction by order of Government. The marks on the brutes are said to be unknown in that part of the world, possibly if they were down here owners might be found. We verily believe that every imaginable mark capable of being put on an animal's hind quarter is registered at the Ozone Hotel. This subject, it appears, is attracting attention in Rosario, and Government anxious to know what the marks used in the province are, and the owners, has asked for a competent party to come forward and make a tender for getting up a book of marks for Santa Fe.

Turcoman tobacco is coming down from the interior, and several lots are offered for sale in Rosario. We are delighted to see this, as it is a splendid staple. A new firm has been started in Rosario and San Juan; Messrs. Moreno Brios, and the managers of the houses

seem to be of Neutonic descent, Mr. William Williger and Mr. German Conroy.

Mr. Perkins, the talented editor of the 'Petro-sarri,' is most untiring in his effort to further the Argentine Central Railway Company; he has subscribed for twelve hundred shares. This beats all the Buenos Ayres editors hollow. We took ten, and if the price of ounces was not fixed, intended taking ten more. Mr. Perkins deserves our warmest praise for laboring in so noble a cause. We want more Perkinians in the River Plate.

Mr. Michael Vidal has lost some Treasury notes in the streets of Rosario. It is surmised that they were dropped in the street and lost in the mud.

Mr. Tilton, the popular manager of Messrs Smith's Bros., of Montevideo, is shortly to leave Rosario for Montevideo; his loss will be greatly felt amongst the foreigners.

Amongst the extraordinary items from Rosario is that at the printing office of the 'Petro-sarri' there are goats for sale.

The Emperor's ultimatum or protest, has been published, and has produced almost the same effect in Rosario as it did in B. Ayres. All thinking men agree that Peru must blame herself for the trouble she herself has caused.

The 'Petro-sarri' has attracted our attention that Mr. Taboada's province is the most peaceable in the republic. Who has ever heard of a revolution in Santiago del Estero?

'Dimeas no has Sr. Don Simon,' is all the rage at present in Rosario. This funny face is quite a favourite on the river.

Our colleague states that there is a profound silence as to the Commissioners of the National Debt. We only wish that Mr. Perkins could drop in one fine morning to see how the Ocampo's office he would soon after his opinion; and then again has not Mr. Gordilla been despatched?

Some anonymous correspondent asks what Paraguay means to do in the Peruvian question? We take upon ourselves to answer the question. Judging from the discreet policy of President Lopez, we should say that he means to assist America and refrain from invading Europe.

An auction of land took place in Rosario on the 11th, 12th, and 13th inst., by order of Government. The land is situated in the department of Union. We have not heard how the bidding went.

CORRIENTES.

The Convention having concluded its labors and reformed the Provincial Constitution, with a clause that it cannot now be altered for 10 years. Governor Lagraña has signed his jubric and it becomes law. Don Felipe Corbal having declined the post of Minister of Government, Don Antonio Segovia has been appointed to the office. The Municipality of Corrientes is making some reforms in the Police department, and the state of the prison being disgracefully insecure, measures are taken respecting same. It is surprising that crime is not still more frequent, as murder may be said to offer comparative impunity. It is only a few days since we mentioned the case of a robbery near a cold bath, and after being twice condemned to death was finally made a soldier with full pay and rations. We now send the 4th of August 1853 (the day of the massacre at Talamio, in Peru) the assassin Leonardo Gomez surprised a poor fellow named Eugenio Almiron the highway near Empedrado, and barbarously murdered him; it was proved that he had sworn to kill his victim wherever he found him, and after his arrest he confessed to do so (with several others) from prison, but was retaken. The first court sentenced him only to seven years' servitude, and afterwards the crime was clearly proved, Gomez being taken with the bloody knife in his hand; on a second trial he was condemned to be shot, but was commuted. The latter part of this was a joke for the hide-and-seek system gave him a third trial, which confirmed his diploma for military service, prolonging the term of his confinement. A special is provided regarding his pay and rations.

Man named Jose Joaquin broke into a house at Monto castros, on the 28th Nov. 1853, and robbed the place, afterwards spending the money in an Italian pulperia, belonging to one Solari; he accused two friends of being his accomplices, and for this ingratitude the court ordered him military service for five years with full rations and half pay.

At the wool cutting establishment (obra) of D. Felisario-Berque, in the Gran Chaco, a fight occurred, resulting in several wounds to the former and the death of the latter. The cause has been ascertained, as the event is likely to compromise the safety of the white men in the Chaco, the Indians making a rule to kill so many in retaliation for one of their people.

Mr. Ziuny reports 3 boarders and 97 day scholars in the Nat. College, but complains of the bad attendance of the children; D. Carlos Roselli has been named chief assistant to the active and intelligent Mr. Ziuny.

There is not a word about cotton, and this is a great matter, as the progress of our colleagues is now unaccountable. The 'Progreso' fills its columns with nonsense about Peru, instead of attending to the real industrial interests of Corrientes. Little hope can be held out for such people, and we hardly expect to see that province keep pace with the rest, in any great march of progress on which the Republic is now entering. Until crime be punished and industry fomented, we strongly advise immigrants not to think of settling in Corrientes, wherever straggling the professions of Government.

PROGRESS IN PARAGUAY.

We read in the 'Semana' that the railway from Asuncion to Pirayra is no longer managed by English engine drivers, but by two Paraguayans named Juan G. Almiron and Escobedo Ramos. After a few years the country will be entirely independent of foreign genius, native youth being educated in all the various branches of scientific and mechanical skill. One hundred young men are receiving the most superior education which the (rotten) kingdoms of Europe can afford, and a much larger number is under the public superintendence of experienced Englishmen. Paraguayans prove remarkably apt scholars; among others, Francisco Barreira, Minister at Paris and Louisa, only 27 years old, will make a favorable impression in Europe. And at home this wonderful progress will be more remarkable when the railways, telegraphs, postal etc. are in full play. The telegraph lines, so ridiculed by the 'Nacion Argentina,' if for no other purpose, will prove of great utility in rendering the frontiers of Paraguay, in a few years, impregnable. We will elapse before the Argentine Republic can boast such splendid frontier service as exists from the Eye Eocos to the uttermost extremity of Paraguay. The trains on the unfinished line to Villa Rica run now three days in the week, instead of one day, as before.

CAMP NEWS.

The state of the roads is truly awful. On Friday a distinguished Belgian merchant of this city was driving slowly down the Calle Larga, intent upon buying wool at the first baracca he entered, when suddenly he came upon one of Admiral Ma's trenches, and a general smash ensued. We don't mean to say that the merchant smashed, but his gig—a brand-new Milard—was knocked into a cocked hat. We leave our readers to imagine the plight of the owner.

The Barrena dil gencos we hear are shortly about to reduce the fare to five dollars, as since they have charged ten dollars people prefer walking to sitting in greasy diligences.

The roads are now getting a little better, but last week they were in an awful state. Only a few days ago, a gentleman who had invested in a sewing machine, was nearly capized at the Tres Esquinas; luckily the pig righted and the sewing machine was saved.

One of the most favorite amusements now-a-days in the Partido of Eschmadra is sheep stealing. We heard of a case the other day where three fellows went in broad daylight and cut away a pointer from a poor man's flock. The owner, being alone, was afraid to go near the robbers, but started off for the Alcalde. When he got back the sheep were gone and no trace or tidings of the robbers. What a scandalous thing to occur in the populous camp of Buenos Ayres; why, in Santa Fe or Cordova such a thing was never attempted.

Freights per bullock carts to the country towns in this province are at

present on the most frightful scale. People will hardly believe it; yet positively it costs less to send a bullock to England than to Chascomus. The cartmen, notwithstanding, are just as poor as ever, verily the old saying, "it goes ill with the good man," now wagon enterprise, we fear, is anything but lucrative at present, owing to the poor condition of the horses, and miserable state of the roads.

The shepherders are at last, thank heaven, doing well. This winter has been up to the present peculiarly favorable, and we know of hundreds of persons who are waiting until shearing to invest in sheep. The lambing this year has, however, been very backward, owing, we believe, to the drought last year.

ENGLISH MEN.

An English gentleman, who has just arrived from Entre Rios, states that he has been to Uruguay, and spent a few days there. San Jose, he says, is completely deserted, and the owner has become extremely peevish. The garden, which was once so attractive, is overgrown with weeds; under the table which the Captain-General keeps, has sunk to the level of an ordinary estancia's. Things have wonderfully fallen off late at San Jose: the General talks about cows and jerked beef, instead of as formerly about international rights and the law of nations. Cold, distant, and surly is the owner of San Jose represented to be, instead of affable and hospitable, as was his wont.

We visited San Jose in 1850, it was then the residence of an English nobleman. Our friend visited it in 1861, and found it the unpromising dwelling of an Entre Riano estanciaero. In Galesguaychí is becoming quite unattractive. Several foreigners have found their way up there, and invested in land and sheep. The Manz Bank is about to open a branch in this thriving town. This was all that was wanted to give this place alight, but the month of the Arroyo must be cleared, so as to let the steamer in. A few dollars spent in this way will make Galesguaychí the first town in the Uruguay.

IMPORTANT MEASURE.

On Friday a measure of great importance passed the House of Representatives and the public will wait with longed-for anxiety to learn how it has become law. It is one providing a subsidy of \$150,000 a year for the establishment of direct steamship communication between the United States and Brazil subject to the appropriation of a similar amount for the same service by the Brazilian Government.

The proposed steamship subsidy, which we expect for facilitating inter-communication by mail and otherwise between two great communities, may be supposed to have a fair chance of becoming an accomplished fact. The further stages it has to pass in Congress present no insuperable difficulties; and there never was a moment more favorable than the present for making to Brazil a proposal of cooperation in a commercial undertaking. The time is opportune on the ground of the existing difficulties between the Brazilian Empire and England—difficulties which, as every one knows, have had their origin mainly, not exclusively, in commercial or commercial discrepancy, and the recurrence of which—the Government of Brazil will no doubt see—can be in great part prevented by a permanent arrangement of direct competition with England that is at present exists for the Brazilian carrying trade.

Then, again, the advantage of a cooperative enterprise of this kind is for the time of the greatest consequence, in view of the temporary continuance of prostrating on the high seas. The Brazilian Company's vessels, by a naturally carrying a flag which will give them immunity from the risks of piracy; and through this, in a commercial sense, are not inferior to any. It will well to reckon the advantage now, in view of having the proposed steamship line in operation at the earliest possible moment.
