UNITED STATES SANITARY COMMISSION.

The meeting convened by Messrs. Jacobs, Zimmerman and Perry took place on Monday afternoon at the Hon. Mr. Kirk's rooms. We noticed the following gentlemen present:

Messrs. C. H. Folmar, Wilson Jacobs, Wm. H. Moores, Edward Zimmerman, Charles Zimmerman, Henry Zimmerman, W. T. Livingston, Miriam, F. L. Jacobs, W. Jacobs Jr., C. H. Schoch, Capt. Dillingham, Rev. Mr. Goodfellow, Messrs. Helper, Langdon, Perry, Curmann, Eastcott, Tay, Upson, Harris, Gerhart, Blier and Walker.

The business of the meeting was moved by Mr. Wilson Jacobs, who moved that the Hon. Mr. Kirk, United States Minister, take the chair: Mr. Livingston seconded the motion. The Hon. Mr. Kirk, on taking the chair, rose and said: "Gentlemen, being called to fill the chair at so important a meeting as the present, I feel bound to explain to you the noble object for which it has been convened. Actuated by a humane desire to assist the poor, bleeding, suffering soldiers in North America, a society of benevolent persons have organized in the United States what is termed 'The United States Sanitary Commission: we have assembled here to-day, gentlemen, at this distant spot, to assist that Commission. Will it not be grateful news for the members of that Commission to learn that their friends and their fellow-countrymen here have not forgotten them in this hour? Gentlemen, I will not detain you with any prolonged remarks, but I am pleased to think that, waisted on the breeze to our native land are borne the tidings of sympathy and assistance from Americans and their friends in the Argentine Republic."

Mr. Jacobs then rose to move that a Secretary to the meeting be appointed: he proposed Mr. Ayres. Mr. Helper, U. S. Consul, seconded the motion. Mr. Jacobs then proposed that some evidence be read to prove to all present the great usefulness of the United States Sanitary Commission.

Mr. Gardner B. Perry, one of the gentlemen who signed the requisition convening the present meeting, came forward and said: "Gentlemen, I have had, during my recent visit to the States, full opportunity to observe the very great benefits of the Sanitary Commission. On the 10th of June, 1863, the first Commission was named. I myself have inspected the hospitals. I have seen how the money which the Commission collected has been expended and I most unhesitatingly assure you that through the assistance which has been rendered by the agents of the Commission, much human sorrow has been alleviated. The total amount of money collected by way of subscription in Maryland is two millions, and in some nine millions, irrespective of the exhibitions in New York, Boston, and elsewhere yielded, (Mr. Kirk, The exhibition in Cincinnati gave \$200,000). Dr. Bellows had assured me that contributions had been received from all parts of the world except, he believed, the east coast of South America. In May, 1863, the prime movers of the Sanitary Commission went to Washington to urge on the Administration the necessity of introducing some measure for sanitary reform; they also asked for the appointment of a Sanitary Commission with a general superintendency of all matters connected with the sanitary condition of the army."

LATEST FROM SAN JUAN.

By the last mails from the interior we receive a long letter, with nothing in it, from this province, published in the 'Ferro-carril'.

Our readers will be surprised to learn that the latest news from the only mining province in the republic is that the editor of the 'Zonda' refused to publish an article on Geology. We are quite surprised that the talented editor of the 'Ferro-carril' of Rosario would fill up his paper with such nonsense. We want to hear of Mr. Rickard and his mines, and the other mining enterprises in that province, not to be obliged to swallow a long rigmarole of recriminations on a science about which neither the editor of the 'Zonda' nor his indignant correspondent probably possess even the rudiments.

The last news of importance from San Juan was that Rickard was going ahead, and that the people were about to embrace sheep-farming on a limited scale. We hope that some of the foreigners resident in San Juan will hereafter do us the favour to send us news of importance by each diligence, as the people of Buenos Ayres preserve the greatest interest in mining matters.

If we are to believe report, some of these fine days gold in large lumps is to be found in some of the provinces, in large quantities. We believe that this is yet on the cards, and that when foreigners get well scattered up the interior another California will be discovered.

The revolution in Salta seems to have caused but little attention in San Juan, as there is not a word in the papers about it. But why is it that the 'Zonda' does not exchange with the 'Standard'? Verily there must be something rotten in the state of San Juan.

ROMANCE OF THE LOTTERY.

Last week a speculative housemaid, in the service of Mr. Gowland, was induced to invest 20 dols, conjointly with a black man, in the Municipal Lottery, sarcastically called 'Beneficencia.' Maryanne was for some days agitated by the hopes and fears incidental to such enterprises; nor could the everyday labours of domestic life distract her attention from the lucky number. Mechanically she dusted the drawing-room furniture: even when making the beds, her thoughts ran on the great prize, and 'what she would do with it,' if the golden apple of Hesperides should drop into her lap. How she longed to embrace these little lottery boys, if they would but bring her the happy announcement; and then in her mind's eye she saw visions of snowy flocks, and a neat rancho in the distance, with the pride of her heart mounted on a 'mancaron' and galloping up to the 'palenque.' As the day of drawing approached, her anxiety redoubled, and at length her black friend had the satisfaction to announce to her that their joint investment had turned out most profitably, showing a clear gain of 650 per cent. He handed her 150 dols. (paper), and remarked, that as money was of little use to him, she might as well take another 100 dols., which he also gave her. Maryanne was not to say charmed with such disinterestedness, but as Virgil said, 'Timeo Danaos et dona ferentes,' she had vague suspicions, or, in vulgar language, 'began to smell a rat.'

To give information to the Police, seize the black deceiver, and make him confess that he had drawn the Great Prize, was the work of a few hours. Bambo had really got 100,000 dollars less five per cent deducted by the office, and not content with the half, he betrayed the confidence reposed in him by Maryanne. We are happy to say that the latter has received 47,500 dollars net, and the negro is condemned to sweep the muddy streets for some weeks in reward of his perfidy. Great praise is due to Sor. Pacheco who discovered the fraud and has been the means of putting Maryanne in possession of a handsome fortune (\$350). We hope Sor. Oson will fine the negro heavily, for the benefit of the charitable institutions.

Mr. Mulhall (of the 'Standard') took exception to the wording of the fourth resolution, and moved, as an amendment, that the word 'Americana,' be changed to 'subscribers and friends of the movement.' He stated that he regarded it as unjust towards the public, to confine the present appeal to Americans only, as he believed all who had their hearts in the right place, whether English, Irish, Scotch, or German, would willingly subscribe for so laudable a purpose. The amendment to the resolution was put by the chairman to the meeting, and carried unanimously. The resolutions were then moved, seconded, and adopted.

A slight discussion arose as to the number of the committee. After a few observations from some of the gentlemen present, it was agreed that the following gentlemen should be named to act on the committee, with power to them to nominate sub-committees:—

Rev. Mr. Goodfellow, Mr. W. Livingston, Mr. Wilson Jacobs, Mr. C. E. Zimmerman, Mr. G. B. Perry, Mr. W. H. Moores, Mr. H. T. Zimmerman.

The Chairman having asked if any gentleman wished to offer any suggestion to the meeting, Mr. Blier, who said: "Gentlemen, there is an English monthly publication in this city, known as the 'River Plate Magazine,' of which I am the editor, and being anxious to further the objects for which this meeting has been called, I offer, gentlemen, to put an advertisement in the front or reverse side of said publication; also to forward circulars to all the subscribers of the magazine. I would, further, say, that as the native papers are friendly disposed, particularly the 'Tribuna,' that its report of this meeting should be translated into Spanish, and published in the aforesaid papers."

The Chairman then moved the adjournment of the meeting, sine die. The meeting then separated.

With a view to appoint sub-committees as they may consider advisable.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The committee appointed at the American Sanitary meeting, on Thursday, has named its officers as follows: Chairman, Rev. Mr. Goodfellow; Treasurer, Wilson Jacobs Esq; Secretary, Gardner B. Perry Esq. A full report of the meeting will be found in to-day's paper.

The 3rd. No. of M. Palliere's pictorial Album was sent round yesterday: it comprises a Souvenir of Entre Rios, and a Halt in the Pampas. The lithographic part is much better than the former numbers, or indeed than anything we have hitherto seen in B. Ayres. We will treat of the subject to-morrow. There is nothing new from Montevideo. A meeting of the Oriental refugees in this city took place on Monday night and resolutions were passed, a la Tribuna, in direct hostility to the mediation of Messrs Thornton and Elizalde between Ures, Aguirre and Gen. Flores. Nevertheless the prevailing impression about town is, that peace has been made. English weather continues, and our barometrical friend M. Jaeggli has foretold that this will be an unusually wet winter. We have not seen the sun for several days, which makes us think it is a splendid time for photographers. Yesterday was the shortest day. Although Friday will be the feast of St. John, there seems no 'Veranito' this year. All the young ladies are busy making up Cedulas de San Juan, an amusement similar to English Valentine's, and a general drawing of sweet hearts by lottery will take place among our native friends, on the evenings of the 23 and 24th. We are glad to learn that Mr. Gifford, the eminent merchant of this city, had sufficiently recovered from his recent illness to accompany his brother from Rio Janeiro to England. Two English capitalists have recently gone up to Rosario, and purchased two fine estates in the province of Sta Fe. We hear to-day of another English gentleman who intends leaving by next steamer, in company with a leading broker, for the same purpose and destination. Animated by a spirit of improvement, the Club Progress intends to make a proper street-crossing, such as is usual among the "rotten" capitals of Europe. We withdraw our suggestions about bringing out 100 Dublin policemen: the poor fellows would be so horrified at the condition of our streets that they might commit suicide 'en masse,' like Atar-gull's comrades. The Pavon will be again placed on the Rosario route by the 1st of July, when her repairs, cleaning, &c., will be completed. The contractors who have her in hand are Messrs. Saunders, Hodge, and Marshall. A lamentable accident is reported in one of the morning papers as having happened to the Custom House broker, Mr. Ferrer; but this is untrue, as we had the pleasure to see that gentleman yesterday in the enjoyment of robust health. The French barque Costa Rica, from Havre, has brought out a splendid battery of chemical apparatus for the University. Apropos, we are glad to see so flattering a report of Major Alejandro Diaz, who entered the military college of St. Cyr, three years ago, and after a brilliant examination has been gazetted to a company in a French infantry regiment. He is brother to Col. Pedro C. Diaz, chief of a battalion in the Argentine army. General Paunero's plan for drawing a frontier line from Mendoza and the foot of the Andes to Sierra Ventana in this province, along the base of the Rio Colorado. As it is necessary to take down the maps and study this closely, we will postpone our opinion on the matter. The following are the members already engaged for the Literary Club:— President Mitre, D. STEAMBOAT SUICIDES.

So much is now said against Government granting subsidies to proposed steamboat companies, that we think if our enlightened legislators will but look over the history of steam navigation, they will discover that the companies which have been liberal in subsidies, are the only nations which possess, to any extent, important steamboat lines. Through a most reprehensible meanness, the United States, which once held the carrying trade of the North Atlantic, has not now a single steamer of her own running to Europe. England and France have their lines, but if they have, the Governments have most liberally supported them. M. Cunard's line dates from 1835, when he first entered into a contract with the British Government to run five steamers from Liverpool to Boston, via Halifax, for an annual subsidy of \$450,000. In 1846 the contract was extended, and four additional vessels were to be added to the line, which was thenceforward to run weekly, making alternate trips to New York. The subsidy was at the same time, increased to \$725,000. This sum was subsequently increased to \$881,700, the amount at present paid to Cunard, the other great British lines, beside the Cunard, are the Peninsular and Oriental Company, connecting Southampton with Lisbon, Gibraltar, Malta, Marseilles, Alexandria, Suez, Bombay, Calcutta, &c.; the West India Royal Mail Packet Company, the Pacific Steam Navigation Company; the African Steamship navigation, the Union (Cape of Good Hope) Steamship Company, and the Galway (Irish) line. The aggregate subsidies paid by the British Government to these companies, exclusive of the Railway line (the contract for which is likely to be broken) amount in round figures to \$4,700,000 annually. The French system of ocean steam navigation is worked under large Government subsidies and supervision, by a company called the Messageries Impériales. The company's operations include the Mediterranean line, the East India service, and two Trans-Atlantic lines, one from Bordeaux to Brazil and La Plata, another to Mexico, touching at Santiago de Cuba, and at Martinique. Another French line of six vessels will this Spring or Summer commence semi-monthly trips from Havre to New York.

APPELLING DISASTER IN NEW YORK HARBOUR.

36 men scalded to death.

A most terrible accident occurred in the lower bay on Friday afternoon, owing to the explosion of one of the boilers of the United States gunboat Chenango, Lieutenant Commander T. S. Fillebrown. She was proceeding to the mooring buoys at the Horseshoe, for the purpose of correcting her compass, and was to have taken the iron clad Onondaga in tow this morning and gone to sea, Fortress Monroe being her destination. When opposite Fort Hamilton, at a quarter past four P. M., her port boiler suddenly exploded, blowing up the decks and severely scalding all connected with the engineer's department—thirty three in all. One was blown overboard, but subsequently recovered, but badly injured; one has died, and the remainder are in a very critical state. Several of them will probably die. The United States revenue cutter Bronx, being in the vicinity, immediately repaired to the scene of disaster, and proceeded to the Quarantine, where she procured a number of physicians, and took them on board the Chenango to relieve the sufferers. The United States steam transport Tilley, Captain Bourne, from Alexandria, while coming up witnessed the explosion, and immediately went to the Chenango's assistance, doing a great deal of good. Also the United States steamer Rose, which was near at hand, rendered all aid in her power. The Tilley and Rose and the cutter Bronx took her in tow and brought her to the Navy Yard. When the Chenango left the Navy Yard the yards of the North Carolina were manned by order of Captain Meade, and three cheers were given in compliment to the crew of the new vessel. The salute was returned by the sailors on board the Chenango, and amidst loud and prolonged huzzahing the gunboat glided out into the stream and proceeded on her voyage down the bay. Hardly two hours had elapsed from the time of her departure when news of the shocking disaster was received at the Navy Yard, producing the most intense excitement among the seamen, and casting a deep gloom where all had been life and activity. Thirty six of the crew have since died. The Chenango was a side wheel steamer, known as a double-ender. She had an armament of ten guns, and was built by Jero Simonson, at Greenpoint, F. I., and launched in 1863. The following are her dimensions:— Length over all..... 240 feet. Extreme breadth..... 85 feet. Depth of hold..... 12 feet. Tonnage..... 940 tons.

The scenery is extremely varied and reminds me in its picturesque character, of the glens of Scotland. Numerous rapid mountain streams are diverted to fertilize tracts of land and intersect it in every direction. No more admirable combination of pastoral, arable, and mineral wealth could be imagined.

We are just off to visit an extensive sheep-farming establishment. I expect to be in Buenos Ayres about a week after this reaches you, and am, dear Sir, Yours faithfully, N. N.

JUSTICES "A LA RUSSE"

The 'Tribuna,' 'Pueblo,' and French paper, are full of complaints about the Criminal Judge of Mercedes. It is amusing to see how surprised our colleagues are at an isolated case of undue severity. The judge who is called Criminal, has not done anything to scandalise our judicial board. He merely stopped the mail-coach and imprisoned the mayor's domo, because a friend in Chivilcoy had forgotten to write to him (vide 'Le Progres.') Far from blaming the judge, we return our sincerest thanks that the ambulating Frenchman was not at once hanged, drawn, and quartered: good heavens! he little knew the avenging powers of a camp judge. It may at first seem unfair to incarcerate the Frenchman for the remissness of a third party in Chivilcoy, but we congratulate Dr. Zarabia on his moderation in not putting all the passengers in the stocks, as might have happened with another Criminal Judge.

Dr. Zarabia is a very nice man, and quite worthy of the judicial body which he has now called into notice. We remember an Argentine Senator observing to us that most camp justices were 'grandes hijos de —' (which nearly corresponds to the term 'grandco,') and we are happy to find Dr. Zarabia bearing out our idea of the body.

Our remarks in this morning's paper upon the state of the money market were greatly spoken about on the Bols, and some brokers went so far as to say that the Standard was under Bull influence. Such observations, however, are only attributable to persons who cannot translate our motto at the head of the paper. The money market of Buenos Ayres is in a rather critical state, owing to the recent failure of Civaleri and friends, coupled with the general belief that England is going to war. Any serious crisis in this market at present would lead to the most injurious consequences, because the only subject of speculation—the currency—would at once depreciate. It is a delusion to term the transactions on the Bols as speculations in specie or paper money—it is speculation in the price of bread, tea and sugar. If stocks rise or fall at home, only those who deal in them suffer, but here in Buenos Ayres it is different, and if patoons go up, tea and sugar go with it. Sooner or later a stop must be put to this nefarious fluctuation in the price of the necessities of life.—M. Riestra's project should be passed.

There is no cause for supposing that any immediate crisis is at hand, nor do we think that we can be so misunderstood, as to be open to the charge of giving any needless alarm; by no means; but as we are obliged to chronicle the state of the market, we must speak the truth. The Civaleri failure has had a very serious effect, and bill brokers find greater difficulty than usual in getting second-class bills discounted; besides this, the private letters received by the merchants, per last packet, were of a character to induce the greatest circumspection. Furthermore, the dangerous business which has been going on for the last 12 months, of buying in specie and selling in currency, must terminate badly.

These are the reasons which cause the uneasy feeling—which we notice—in the money market. If the legislators of this country have the courage, the capacity, we may say the honesty, to set about and reform the currency, then many of those evils will be remedied; but if, on the contrary, year after year is to pass over burning paper money, which is hourly becoming cheaper and more inflated, we must, some day or other, come to an unpleasant wind up. If any better scheme than that of M. Riestra's can be introduced, then why not adopt it? We opine that it is the wisest, safest, and most feasible, and therefore should be passed.

We are pleased to notice the great demand which has sprung up for National Bonds. \$20,000 'fuertes' were sold to-day at 40 per cent. cash. This is a good sign, as it shows that there is increased confidence in the stability of the National Government; but those bonds should be put on the Bols and quoted.

We perceive a sale of 4,000 Bolivianos at the rate of 20 7/8 per cent. An English vessel we are told has been put on the berth to load for Antwerp. We have not heard her name, as the brokers don't think it worth their while to either give it to us or advertise her.

There are at this time many thousands of Confederate prisoners of war confined in the various forts and camps of the Northern States. A large proportion of them are wounded or sick, and all are in a state of destitution, the accounts of which, as given in private letters and in the newspapers, present a picture of human suffering, which has scarcely a parallel in modern times. The most necessities of life are wanting, and frequently the wounded prisoner has no raiment save that which is stark and stiffened with his clotted blood. Horrible as war is in all its features, assuredly it has no greater horrors than the long agony of the poor captive who, when the feverish excitement of the contest is over, is left to the bitter charity of strangers and foes, without one friendly hand to soothe the pains of body or friendly voice to whisper hope and comfort to his despairing mind. These men, cut off from the assistance of their kindred or the protection of their Government, have peculiar claims on the patriotism of their countrymen in Europe, and upon christian benevolence everywhere. They did not recklessly or from choice embrace the profession of arms, but in exchanging the comforts, and often the luxuries, of home for the toils and hardships of a soldier's life, they obeyed a stern sense of duty and the call of their country in its extremest need. An unusual proportion, also, of those that fill the ranks of the Confederate armies belong to the higher walks of life, upon whom privations, such as are endured by prisoners in the hands of the North, fall with increased severity.

The Southern Prisoners' Relief Fund is intended to mitigate some of these sufferings which cannot altogether be relieved. Within little more than a twelvemonth, nearly 23,000 have been collected and expended in relief. The managers of the Fund are assisted in their efforts by self-devoted ladies in the principal Northern cities, who visit the sufferers and give them such aid as the means at their disposal render possible. Of late the Federal Government has granted permission that this Sanatarian work may be done openly. It is earnestly hoped that all Southerners residing in South America will support the Fund to the extent of their ability, and its objects may recommend themselves to all irrespective of country or political convictions, who sympathize with the sufferings of their fellow-men.
