HERN IN PATAGONIA.

Well it was (as I said in my former letter) the last Saturday in April that I got on board of Nancy. Riley, I came from San Fernando del night before when I'd been hiding myself for a month or so because of the trouble I was in along with the tailor's windows and ribs that I loose with the bottles beer when I was playing Carnival out of the balcony of my quarters in the Hotel del Globo. Anyhow I got comfortably on board, and I was dark—though there was more noise on one of them fellows that smoke paper cigars and wear oil-kin caps with brass edges to them looking out might as well be at the hotel for me because I was wanted in the big building in the Plaza—before I went on board however a young gentleman, a friend of mine, came to me and said "Bein my boy, my lanket out of town this evening, and I want the loan of a few hundred dollars till Monday morning." To be sure you do say I, and dealt out the notes and said as I was going away on board a vessel that moment he could pay me when I got back. All right says he and he left me with I O U of his photograph when he went out of the house, so as that I might look him again if I ever caught sight of him, and I think there's great value, because I'm certain that the same lad will be a celebrated or at least an elevated individual one of these days; but for all that I'm none to part with the documents and any gentleman that's got a thrille of patience and does not mind waiting to be paid, can treat with me for the writings, and for cash; I'll go bald but I give him a liberal discount. Sure I leave it to you, and I believe, that this is not a fair deal, but what do you think the same lad done with me money; it came out afterwards that he had been borrowing dollars on the same tale from me own fellow passenger, Scott, who reminded him that some day that he was going away south, and he would be glad to see his money back before he went out of the house. I'm sitting here he took my money back the way to the Scott, and paid him like a gentleman, and maybe that same Highlander has not been laughing at me these three months out of the house ever I talked me back on Buenos Ayres to go South the young gentleman did the same, though it was to the North he went, to Liverpool, on board the Una steamer, and I think the captain of that vessel by this time will be sorry that he took his I O U for the price of his passage. It's no use troubling you with the details of the details of a commonplace sea voyage, it's sufficient to say we were not all drowned, as you put in your paper, but that at the end of 10 days we arrived at the house of the Rio Negro, fatigued about 41 South, but that bar is the devil's own bar, we could not get in nor the pilot came out, and the captain of the matter was, we were drove to the Cape Horn storm for eleven days, and neither sailor nor stars we saw most of that time, but the captain guesed we were between the Cape of Good Hope and the land islands, though he would not take on himself to say within a few degrees where we were; all on board was wild with the storm, and a severe headache, but a little made us curse and swear thickly at each other and at the sky and the storm and the bar, not forgetting the pilot as could not come out to us; however on the evening of the eleventh day we got back to the bar where we were drove from, and it being moderate weather, Mister Abel, the pilot came on board of us, and brought us under the lee of some high land hills where we let go our anchor in five fathoms water, and made all snug for the night, waiting for the daylight near as we got across the bar, and as sure as I'm alive I'd have given no small thrille to be back safe in Buenos Ayres, for the breakers telling over it was dreadful to see and hear, and made me all of a thrilble the whole of that night. In my next letter I'll begin telling you of all about them pilot, men, manners, creatures, and country, and must conclude this letter, but before I do I am going to inform you that as usual I get into trouble on board the Nancy. This is how it was: one day I was told that there was a constabulary of a week, the storm abated a bit, so the Scott and myself took to shooting them big birds that's called partridges and allsorts, but it's ne'er a one we could hit because Miss Riley was rolling herself about treacherously, so I thought to myself, think I'll try and shoot the mizen cross trees, where there's a good rest and good looking on, and may be I'll have a better chance of taking a steady aim you know; and as I was gun all complete and soon after I did come up under our stern and I let drive at him, but at the moment the vessel gave a big roll, so instead of

hitting the bird I hit the nigger man that was steering the ship, his name was Cook Teaco, and after name he had; he steered himself away in the vessel about two years ago, when she was at one of the Prince West Indies Islands, and had been in her ever since, so as he had no name the captain christened him Cook Teaco; he was always grinning and in everybody's way, and this time he put himself in my way when I was firing at the bird—of all the outrageous scoundrels ever a man put out of him, you never heard the like, when the nigger felt the shot in his black skin: he dropped the wheel at once, and in course the ship twisted round and the storm took the double reefed main top-sail on a cruise away to leeward, and the jigger-boom was made into two neat halves, not to say anything of the jib-boom that was sprung out other cabins done this I'm not able to tell you. Out comes the captain from the cabin, and it was 'all hands on deck,' and there was rioting and swearing about the vessel for no short time after. I did not know what it was all about till Cook Teaco pointed to me on the mizen cross trees, where the murderer came with, and the mates along with the captain came up and took me away from them, and had made up their minds to hang me, only my friend the young Scott interceded for me and got me off, telling them it would be as bad as murder to hang a B—J that I had killed. It is rather dull times on 'Change at present. The few important things that are going on, we are not not to say a word about, and all the rest is nonsense and trash, fleeting visions of a broker's imagination. The majority on 'Change think that patacons must descend, as with the project hanging over us, and the sheening time approaching, paper must improve and become in the greatest demand, but if we were to offer an opinion, we would say that these are precisely the reasons which will drive patacons up to 30; and although it is contrary to our rule to offer any individual opinion on the market, we cannot refrain from cautioning our readers in placing too much confidence in the fall. Nothing is surer than to drive men up again, and there are not wanting speculators to effect the operation.

The demand for paper for country purposes must will be sensibly felt, and next month large sums of paper dollars will be sent out to the camp, but the general experience in Buenos Ayres is, that cause and effect are diametrically opposite to what in other countries would be as taken for granted.

Thus before the project is laid before the house, before the public is acquainted with its terms, specie goes down—being we discussed and at good, specie in Buenos Ayres must go up.

For the shearing of twenty millions of sheep, twenty millions of paper dollars will be required, and this sum must be taken off our market; therefore paper money must be in great demand—ergo in Buenos Ayres specie must go up.

So much is said touching the probable future of the market, that we have thought proper to throw out these hints, and we leave it to experienced men to say what they are worth. We regret to say that a rather unpleasant dispute arose yesterday in the immediate vicinity of the Boca, between one of our most popular and fashionable English brokers, and a German gentleman, respecting a letter from the house of Rosenthal, by the name of Rothschild in Frankfurt on the Main, in London, in favor of a Sor. Rosenthal of Frankfurt, and by his duly endorsed in the German press. The amount of the credit was for £100 sterling, but the English broker had shown the letter to some parties who pronounced it that Rosenthal was dead, and secondly that the signature of Rothschild was a forgery—the German gentleman who we believe was furnished with ample documents to prove the contrary was of course most indignant, and demanded the names of the parties who had given the broker such intelligence. High words passed and obscene comments were expressed. We merely mention the circumstance to show the extreme ignorance of even our most leading big fishes respecting the signature of the greatest banker in the world. The German gentleman is of course very judgment, as he in his simplicity believed when he took Rothschild's libel had the best on the face of the globe, but it has proved otherwise in Buenos Ayres.
