Review for Fortnight.

The semi-monthly retrospect affords us little to comment upon, this being the dullest season of the year. Owing to the recent heavy rains, the overland communication is very irregular. Vast troops of bullock carts, which left months ago, laden with produce from some of the distant provinces, are still on the roads, being unable to proceed, from the impassable state of the public highways. Men of every shade of politics watch with anxiety the progress of the works of the Great Argentine Central Railway Company, as it is believed by persons of considerable experience that when that road is open to Cordova, our exports will be doubled or considerably augmented. Highly satisfactory it is to us, to inform our foreign readers that both foreign and native merchants have subscribed liberally to the stock, and we have not the slightest doubt that, after the formation of the company in England and when the share lists are properly made out, the subscriptions on this side of the Atlantic will exceed the 2 millions of patacones which it was thought by the concessionaire would be the amount taken in this country.

Coal has been discovered in several of the interior provinces. Copper abounds in Cordova, silver in San Juan, and wine and sugar in Mendoza; yet, owing to the enormous freights none of these valuable products ever find their way to the Atlantic seaboard. The railroad will open up these countries, which as yet consume scarcely any of our English manufactures, simply because their produce being unobtainable, they have not the wherewithal to pay for them. Every exporter or manufacturer has a direct and positive interest in the success of this enterprise, which, if carried out, will plant English shopkeepers at the foot of the Cordillera.

The disturbances in some remote districts of a few unruly gauchos, have at last been quelled; peace may be said to reign throughout this vast Republic, and if we could only see the irresponsible leader of a set of malcontents in the Republic of the Uruguay arrested and severely punished, we might well say that no country in the world enjoys greater prospects than the neglected Argentine Republic. We have every reason however, for believing that Flores, who has invaded the Banda Oriental for the infamous purpose of creating civil war and upsetting the Government, will be driven out of the country. Not a single man of standing or worth has joined him, which speaks highly for the moral tone of the people of that Republic.

In consequence of this untoward disturbance in the adjoining republic, the saladero business in the Uruguay is temporarily paralyzed, and now, as the wet season has set in, it is more than probable nothing more will be done before Spring.

Trade in Rosario is lamentably dull at present, but it is confidently asserted that, when the winter is over, several of our English houses here will establish branches in that city, as many very important staples are being planted, such as cotton, sugar, and tobacco, on an immense scale. That we will yet become a producing nation, there can be no doubt, as the land is inexhaustibly fertile, the climate is unequalled, and the natives taking example of foreigners, find that husbandry is far more lucrative than civil war. In the city of Buenos Ayres, Congress is at present sitting; several very important measures have been introduced by the Minister of Finance. One

in particular, for the organization of Free Banks, throughout the Republic, which if passed will work a very important change in this country. We have felt it our duty to oppose the measure, in consequence of the fictitious value which the Minister thought proper to put upon the National bonds, which are at present at a great discount, owing to the censurable procrastination of the Minister in paying or recognizing the Treasury and other bills due to foreigners and natives by the late National Government.

The state of our import and export markets is not what we could desire; we refer our readers to the statistics in another column. As regards our railroads we have little to remark; we applied to the manager of the Buenos Ayres Northern Railway for his traffic returns, which we regret to remark, although published at times in a Spanish paper, he omits to send us; we preserve a great interest in the prosperity of the road, and hope that the manager will supply us with figures to convince our foreign readers of the extent of business of the company.

Respecting the Southern or Chascomus Railway, at length we are glad to announce that the works of this important line are likely soon to commence. The communication from the Government respecting the recognition of the contract with Messrs. Peto & Betts was immediately taken into consideration by the Chambers, and in the course of a few days a decree was voted by both Houses authorizing the Government to approve the contract after being examined by professional men. This formality is now being complied with, and in a few days we have no doubt it will be dispatched by the Government, and the Agents of the Company be then in a position to order their Engineer to lay out the line. The following is the decree: "The Government is hereby authorized to recognize as the cost of the works, materials, and ground expropriated of the Great Southern Railway the sum of £651,500 provided that 'on a professional examination of the contract presented by the concessionaire, the works &c prove to be in accordance with the amount specified.'"

Mr. Hopkins has presented a scheme for the canalization of a part of the Paraná which will lessen by fifty miles the sailing distance between this city and Paraguay; the project is before the house, and we have reason to believe will be favorably received.

The state of our money market is anything but desirable; gold has increased in value, and paper money seriously depreciated. Schemes after schemes have been introduced for the amelioration of our currency, but the conviction is gaining ground, that neither the men in office have the capacity to grapple with the subject, nor is the industry of the country sufficient to turn the business of trade in our favor.

(Exchange closes at 65s. 6d. on England. Large sums have been remitted by the Western Railway to pay for Railway iron &c. Sovereigns are not very scarce and may be quoted at \$140 m/c currency.)

LATEST ABOUT FLORES

June 11th 4 P. M.

(Our Private Correspondent)
I have just seen Dn. P. . . . who has come from the Fuerte, and I am told that Trillo has caught a spy of Flores, who is an Italian, and has given very important intelligence to the President. Botana has walked the fellow off to the Police.

To-day Medina's vanguard is expected in Florida, and Don Servando Gomez was in the immediate vicinity of San José. Lucas Moreno has started to-day with his division for a place between the "paso de Cuervo" and Pacheco. Bernardino has passed with 60 men on the 7th inst. for the Estancia de Carabina in Chamiso, for the Department of Misiones, which is in a state of excitement, and all the available men joining the Government forces. Gervasio has arrived with 250 men at Maldonado, to receive arms and clothing, which the Villa del Salto took up last night, to join on afterwards with Olid. This morning a chasque arrived from Don Dionisio, who is marching to a point close to the Puntas de Olimar, with over 500 men.

Flores has beat a retreat, and was yesterday in the Arroyo del Salado, and it is thought that he is moving in the direction of "Barriga Negra," since without doubt he fears his horses will fall him. We will see in two or three days, when all the divisions are got together, that Flores will get shut up in the Sierra.

They can't escape, as scouts are about everywhere, unless the villains join Flores, which if even they do, we have every hope this misguided man will at once deliver them up to justice.

THE FLORES' CAMPAIGN

The invasion has taken a new phase. Flores' game is at length evident to all, and nearly played out. After receiving his Brazilian auxiliaries at Santa Rosa, he besieged Salto, but not being sufficiently strong to storm the town, expected a pronunciamento, by the town folk, in his favor. Failed in this attempt he descended on Paysandu, where, after a day's fighting, he found a repetition of ill-fortune. Evading a pitched battle, which his pursuers were also loth to hazard, he made a rapid movement towards the capital, some of his forces appearing within a league of the city-gates. Rumors of an intended revolt among the citizens, and of disaffection in the garrison, gave hopes that he might quietly march from Canelones into the plaza. But the invader's friends deceived him, & notwithstanding the prestige of his recent victory over Olid and the apathy of Generals Medina and Gomez to oppose him, he lacked confidence to make a bold stroke, by finishing the campaign at Montevideo.

The native population has been either indifferent or opposed to the revolution, and it is doubted that two-thirds of the "liberators" are Brazilians or Corvatinos. The former are said to have deserted "on mas," after passing the Rio Negro; and Flores with reduced numbers [300] made a diversion from Florida to the department of Misiones: here there is an intricate mountain-chain, called Cuchilla Grande, which baffles all pursuit. A bandit, named Leona, held out 3 years, against all the Government forces, in those defiles, making occasional incursions on the adjacent estates.

"El Pais" represents the cause of the Gibstons as lost, their force being under 200; but there is much reason to fear a protracted guerilla struggle, in which the rebels have all the advantages. In fact we may look for a repetition of the Chascomus campaign: it will be almost impossible to suppress the incessant fires, while the hope of seriously disturbing the Government is equally frustrated.

President Berro has gained by reducing his enemies to the level of highway robbers, but the republic has decidedly lost more than it has gained. Montevideo, an established newspaper's chair in the hall of Government. Thus we may say the war has taken the worst possible turn, unless Gomez and Medina display an unusual and unexpected energy, by annihilating the disturbers of public order.

NEWS FROM EUROPE.

The Paraná arrived in Rio Janeiro bringing dates from Europe to May 9th and 350,000 sovereigns for that city, none for the River Plate.

The state of Europe is unchanged; diplomacy is in the field, and active operations are suspended. England is still agitated about the difficulty with the United States. The House of Commons has demanded several explanations from the Cabinet, and a very hostile tone prevails in condemnation of President Lincoln. The American Minister complained to Earl Russell that several British seamen were serving in the Confederate navy: to which the latter replied that he could take no step in the matter, unless the Northons dismissed all the Irish (calculated at 100,000) fighting under the Stars and Stripes. Lord Russell announced in Parliament that the mail-bags of the Potemoff were delivered unopened to the British Consul, but that the steamer was subjected to a Tribunal of prizes. The British Government seems to acquiesce, and rumors of war have greatly diminished. A special commission was despatched from Washington to confer with Mr. Adams, and arrange the existing questions, without an angry and tedious official correspondence. Nevertheless the steel-plated fleet of England has been ordered to the W. Indies, and this step is regarded as a menace.

Lord Napier's correspondence is published, showing the pacific views of England respecting Polish intervention, while protesting against Russian barbarity. The visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to Napoleon is postponed: their first public appearance was hailed with the same enthusiasm as their marriage. On the occasion of their attendance at Covent Garden as much as £10 was paid for a pit-ticket: Bank of England interest has fallen to 3 p. The Princess Helena Augusta Victoria (aged 17) is about to be married to Prince William of Denmark, new King of Greece. The French and Russian ambassadors had a conference with Lord Russell respecting the affairs of Greece.

France is greatly excited about the coming elections for June 7th. The Government in order to prevent disturbance and secure their own candidacies published a notice warning the papers against taking part in any as-

sociation of over 20 persons assembled without permission from the authorities. Emile Girardin condemns this as a favoring of coercion. The Emperor intends publishing a manifesto before the elections. The Journal de Rennes has been suspended for 2 months. A Fine-art Exhibition by the best living artists was opened at the Palais d'Industrie on May 1st.

THE O'CONNELL STATUE.

Quot homines tot sententiae.

Sir,—In your impression this morning I perceive your energetic correspondent "Lamb Deargh" in entering his protest against the above project, evidently takes the field with either a pre-nature view of the matter, or else has a decided aversion to an undertaking which men possessing as much charity as your worthy friend have warmly supported. He clearly goes in for great things, when with one fell swoop he vainly endeavored to quench a flame which has drawn from seclusion men of very opposite opinions, and men who do not often fall into the mistakes which "L. D." commits, by seeking to confound and amalgamate two questions, both alike, honourable and charitable in their way, yet, like two different diseases, cannot be treated by the same prescription. If your worthy friend had taken the trouble to look over the New York, Melbourne, and Californian files he would see that men quite as patriotic as he is, have practically recognised the difference in the two ideas, as with one hand they disavow bread to the poor, whilst with the other they add an extra stone to the pile which is to perpetuate the memory of a man who in his day always incited charity. Of course, according to the apocryphal and ready-baked opinions of some this is called "gingerbread patriotism," and hence, consistent with the same cooked ideas, it must have been "plum cake patriotism" which caused the erection of monuments in Dublin to Nelson, Wellington, Cumberland, the Georges, and William, with £15,000 collected within the present year to perpetuate the memory of Prince Albert. The Irish people gave £120,000 to honour Dargah, they erected monuments (and that in time of need) to Grattan, Curran, Moore, O'Loghlen, Rice, Crampton, Goldsmith, Captain Boyd, &c., but to erect a memorial to O'Connell is a crime, forsooth! but one in which the ablest Irishmen of the day are implicated. Your friend "Lamb Deargh" must be aware that some eight months since a list was opened here for Irish Relief, that collections were solicited publicly by the clergy, and that three or four different sums were remitted. Thus "L. D." must not take up Veritas as he fills: besides, a much larger sum in small remittances has been sent this year to Ireland from Buenos Ayres than in any former one: hence charity plays through more than one channel, but without detracting in the least from the merits of a relief fund, for which there are as warm advocates as your friend "L. D." I fancy there is no cause whatever that he should alarm himself if people wish to exhibit gratitude to the memory of the immortal Liberator, who was himself a sterling advocate of any measure tending to alleviate the social and political misery of his grateful countrymen.

COMMERCIAL REVIEW.

EXPORTS.

Business has been almost entirely suspended for the last fifteen days, on account of the new Custom-house law put into execution on the 1st inst., which imposes a much heavier duty on our products, up to the 1st of July next. Shippers have been busy despatching, as quickly as possible, all their stock on hand, so that our exportation has been very brisk for some days past. To-day there is a lull in transactions, but prices are unchanged. Although the weather, before last week, was very fine, arrivals from the camp have been very limited.

Dry hides—no important sale has taken place, for Europe. The unfavorable news from the Old World has put a stop to all speculation. A few purchases, only, have been effected for U. States, comparatively unimportant. Salted hides—very little doing, and, as stated in last circular, there is no hope of a new supply as our saladeros have stopped working.

Wool—in spite of the bad account from our foreign customers, there has been a pretty constant demand: this is owing to the rise in specie, which forces those who hold paper money to seek, by wool purchases, a more advantageous exchange than the rates in England and France at present offer.
